    live. Manhasset Bay Protection Committee.
        MS. DEONARINE: Thank you.
        So as a reminder, you're recorded
    and the meeting will be transcribed as per the
    Governor's Executive Order.
    We have two new committee member
    representatives that have joined us tonight.
    We have Claire Dorfman from Flower
    Hill. She's a new Trustee and she just got
    appointed to our committee.
    And then we also have Don
    Richardson. He will be replacing Ray Herbert as
    the representative from Plandome.
    So welcome aboard.
    MR. RICHARDSON: Thank you.
    MS. DEONARINE: We can go with
    the introductions.
    CHAIR KEANE So I'll start.
    I'm Bob Keane. I'm from Port
    Washington North. I'm the Chairman.
    MS. DEONARINE: Sarah Deonarine.
    I'm the Executive Director.
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    MR. ARTEL: Mike Artel, Sands
    Point.
    MS. HAGERSON: Nora Hagerson,
Village of Baxter Estates.
    MS. WILSON-PINES: Jennifer
    Wilson-Pines, Village of Manorhaven.
    MS. SHEEHAN: Diane Sheehan,
    Village of Plandome Heights.
    MR. MOLLOY: Mike Molloy, also
    from Baxter Estates.
    Hi, Claire. Good to see you.
    MS. DORFMAN: Hi. This is great.
    MR. CRUCCI: Dan Crucci from
    Nassau County.
    MR. BRAUN: Kevin Braun, Town of
    North Hempstead.
    MS. MENDELSON: Anne Mendelson,
    Village of Great Neck.
    CHAIR KEANE: I think we have a
    guest too.
    MR. PRICE: Yes. This is Steve
    Price. I'm on the Waterfront Advisory Committee.
    I'm a guest on this committee.
    Thank you for having me.
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    CHAIR KEANE: Thanks for coming.
    MS. DEONARINE: Is that everyone?
    CHAIR KEANE: I think that's
    everyone.
    Thank you.
    I'll see if I can share my screen.
Is that showing the agenda?
    MS. DEONARINE: No. I don't see
    it.
    CHAIR KEANE: Now?
    MS. DEONARINE: There it is.
    CHAIR KEANE: Okay.
    It looks like a short meeting.
    MS. DEONARINE: Hopefully.
    (Laughter.)
    MS. DEONARINE: All right.
    So I'll just -- the first motion

it was $400. So it's going to be a lot less than

    MR. ARTEL: Motion to approve.
        CHAIR KEANE: Okay. Mike Artel.
        Do we have a second it?
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MS. SHEEHAN: I'll second it.
CHAIR KEANE: Second by Diane.
All those in favor?
(Chorus of "ayes.")
CHAIR KEANE: Oppose?
(No response.)
CHAIR KEANE: Abstain?
(No response.)
CHAIR KEANE: I'm surveying the

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crowd and motion carries.
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MR. BRAUN: Did we approve the

    meeting.
    CHAIR KEANE: We'll give you one
    abstention.
        Next.
        MS. DEONARINE: The RFP.
        Any discussion about that?
        MR. BRAUN: About the third
    motion?
        MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
        MR. BRAUN: Did you receive the
    comments? I know I provided some. Did you receive
    all the comments?
    MS. DEONARINE: Yes, I believe
    they should be in this version -- incorporated.
                            MR. BRAUN: Did you re-send that
    out?
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            MS. DEONARINE: I believe so.
    Friday. I can send it out again right now.
    MS. WILSON-PINES: Yes.
    MR. BRAUN: Yeah, I don't know
    whether I received it or not. So that's fine.
    CHAIR KEANE: Yeah, I don't know
    either. I haven't had a chance to look at it.
    I've been swamped.
    MS. DEONARINE: And I also got
    comments from Jennifer.
        MS. WILSON-PINES: That was
    awhile ago.
        MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. I don't
    know, that was before our last meeting even.
        MS. WILSON-PINES: Yeah.
        MR. BRAUN: Yeah, the only thing I
        have, Sarah, that I can see is when you re-sent it
    after the last meeting on 9/18.
    But once again, I provided
    comments. So I'm fine.
    If nobody has any further
    discussion, or if there is no further discussion, I
    will make the motion to -- hold on. Let me get
    back to the screen.
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            I make a motion to finalize the
    RFP to hire a contractor to complete a water
quality improvement plan for Manhasset Bay and to
submit to the Town Board for approval.
MS. WILSON-PINES: I'll second
that motion.
CHAIR KEANE: All right.
You got that, Sarah?
MS. DEONARINE: Yes, I do.
CHAIR KEANE: Okay.
MR. BRAUN: Sarah, (Zoom
inaudible) the committee that you did have the Town
Attorney look at this. You did have comment from
everybody on the committee and you gave an
extension to everybody to provide comments at the
last meeting.
MS. DEONARINE: Yes. Yes.
Is there any further discussion?
CHAIR KEANE: So this is the --
the motion was to finalize the RFP. So -- so
basically it's going to be finalized and then we're
going to send it out so -- for the Town to
advertise.
MS. DEONARINE: Well, it has to
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be approved by the Town Board next.
CHAIR KEANE: Oh, okay. I
mis-read that. Okay. So for the Town Board to
approve and then -- then they can advertise it.
MS. WILSON-PINES: How long? Will
it be able to be calendared for this month or is it
going to have to be November?
MS. DEONARINE: November.
MS. WILSON-PINES: Okay.
MR. BRAUN: I'd have -- I'll have
to work with Sarah to figure that ou.
MS. WILSON-PINES: Okay.
CHAIR KEANE: All right.
So do we want to take a vote on
that then?
MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.
CHAIR KEANE: All those in favor
of motion No. 3, to finalize the RFP?
(Chorus of "ayes.")
CHAIR KEANE: All those oppose?
(No response.)
CHAIR KEANE: Abstain?
(No response.)
CHAIR KEANE: Then I guess that
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motion carries.
All right.
No. 4.
MR. ARTEL: Motion to accept
meeting dates set forth --
MS. SHEEHAN: I second that, Mike.
CHAIR KEANE: And Diane seconds.
So the discussion is, obviously
this was checked against the local school
calendars.
MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
CHAIR KEANE: Jewish holidays.
MS. SHEEHAN: More importantly it
was checked against my calendar and it's fine.
(Laughter.)
CHAIR KEANE: Are you jetting off
someplace or something?
MS. SHEEHAN: Do we want a meeting

CHAIR KEANE: Maybe we'll get an
extension again.

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            I mean, these are tentative, they
    can be changed at any time in the future. But sort
    of like for planning purposes, we kind of put it on
    the calendars for the people to go ahead.
    So do I have a motion to -- oh, we
    already had that.
    So all those in favor of those
    dates?
    (Chorus of "ayes.")
    CHAIR KEANE: Okay. All those
    oppose?
            (No response.)
            CHAIR KEANE: None.
            Abstain.
            (No response.)
            CHAIR KEANE: None.
                            So then that motion carries.
                            FEMALE VOICE: Sarah, there's no
    meeting then in November and December; right?
                            MS. DEONARINE: There's no
    meeting in December. We have a meeting scheduled
    for November 12th.
            FEMALE VOICE: Okay.
            MS. DEONARINE: And I was
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planning for that meeting and we'll go over dues
and pass the IMA.
FEMALE VOICE: Okay.
MS. DEONARINE: Can I share my
screen, Bob? I wanted to show everybody --
CHAIR KEANE: You sure can.
MS. DEONARINE: I just wanted to
go over --
CHAIR KEANE: Do you have that
capability or do I have to assign that to you?
MS. DEONARINE: I think you have
to give it to me. Or maybe, you know, host to say
screen share.
CHAIR KEANE: How about now?
MS. DEONARINE: I'm on now.
Okay. So I haven't gone over our
financial status in awhile. Of course -- can you
see it? It says not responding.
So this is what we've spent in the
third quarter. So we received all the dues except
from Nassau County. So that is \$29,400 we've
received.
Nassau County -- they're going
through the process right now. And we should get
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    that -- I'm not sure when. It's coming.
    MR. CRUCCI: Can you hear me?
    MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
    MR. CRUCCI: Okay. Yeah, the
    $24,000 was approved through the system and I
    submitted the claim voucher for payment. So we're
    good to go -- so. So hopefully in a month you'll
    have the deposit into the -- the electronic deposit
    into the North Hempstead account.
    MS. DEONARINE: Thank you.
    That's awesome.
    So you can see -- so what you're
    looking at is just the third quarter expenses which
    were July, August, September. And then year to
    quarter. So everything we spent so far this
    calendar year, to the end of September.
    And it obviously hasn't been much
    because COVID stopped projects or really slowed
    them down, backed them up. So -- so we're not -- I
    mean, we're doing fine financially.
    Hopefully we'll start with some
    outlays probably in the next year that we'll start
    obviously paying money for our water quality
    improvement plan.
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            The work (Zoom inaudible)
    currently working on our quality assurance plan and
    data usability agreement with DEC so we can -- be
    able to get reimbursement from DEC for our water
    quality monitoring starting next year.
    So I'm not expecting any big
    expenses through the end of the year.
    And so I was going to suggest that
    we just keep the dues as is and we'll pass that at
    Our November meeting.
    FEMALE VOICE: Sounds good.
    MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
    And then I have some other
    questions for the committee just to consider.
    So I purchased another domain
    name. So we've got three different domains. We've
    got:
            Manhasset Bay Protection
    Committee; and,
            Then I've got Manhasset Bay.info
    now; and,
            Also, Manhasset Bay.net.
            But the domains come with annual
    fees. They're charged every other year. And I
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just wanted -- we have a line item in our budget if
look at -- oh, it doesn't show. We've got a line
item for -- well, for web design, web posting, \$400
a year. So we'll still be under that for our costs
for our domains.
CHAIR KEANE: Can you do it
longer than two years?
MS. DEONARINE: It doesn't seem
like it.
CHAIR KEANE: In the old days, you
used to be able to do it for like five years. Any
time -- forget about it -- but --
MS. DEONARINE: I don't -- it's a
little frustrating.
CHAIR KEANE: Okay.
MS. DEONARINE: But at the same
time, every two years keeps us on top of what our
expenses are.
So I just wanted to make sure with
the committee that it's all right that I'm
purchasing things for the web that will have
recurring payments, like the worker domain name,
which is \$25 every year, so \$50 for two years, at
least currently.

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            And then if I purchase anything
    for web design, that might incur annual or
semi-annual fee also.
CHAIR KEANE: I think that's fine.
MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
MS. WILSON-PINES: It sounds okay.
MS. DEONARINE: Okay. I just
wanted to make sure about that.
Okay. Well, that's all I have
about money.
MS. WILSON-PINES: Since this is
an expenditure, even though it's small, should we
do a reso? I mean it's underneath the threshold.
MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. And I have
a resolution for -- June 2018 and I'm still
spending money from that, in which we moved \$2,000
and I haven't reached that \$2,000 yet.
FEMALE VOICE: Can you repeat
that, Sarah?
MS. DEONARINE: In June 2018, the
committee approved a resolution giving \$2,000 --
Kevin Braun made a motion for all web expenses up
to \$2,000.
FEMALE VOICE: Okay.
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MS. DEONARINE: So I was thinking if we hired -- we would have hired a design contractor by -- with that money but we haven't done that and I'm not sure if that's going to go through. So I'm planning to start doing design on my own. So we're currently still under \(\$ 2,000\).

CHAIR KEANE: Yeah, I think that's
fine under that expense.
    MS. WILSON-PINES: Yeah.
    MS. DEONARINE: All right.
    I'm going to stop sharing my
    screen.
    All right.
    Are there other things that have
    come up -- just information under updates.
    So you know the 2020 dues,
    everything's paid except Nassau County and that's
    going through the works right now.
        Also, I've got some notifications
    from Eric Schlesinger (phonetic) may have things
    going on.
        Lauren, I think I e-mailed
    everybody that there is a new marsh web-based tool
    to see what the marsh migration's going to do until
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the year 2100. And that can be used by everyone to
do marsh conservation plans, which is important for
dealing with sea level rise, protecting the coast
line.
There is one more webinar and I
can send that around to everyone. Oh, it's
tomorrow morning at 9:00 a.m. Anybody -- but it's
supposed to for every municipality to be able to
think about protecting the shoreline.
And I'm also around after the
meeting.
And then Eric Schlesinger also
contacted -- was contacted by a representative from
the University of Connecticut who was working with
the Center for Watershed Protection and for the
Long Island Sound Study. They're working on a
nitrogen best management practices tracking tool.
Because that's one thing that hasn't been addressed
by the nitrogen that hasn't been addressed by the
nitrogen total maximum daily load -- or nitrogen
from non-point sources.
So they wanted to reach out and
see if there are any communities that could help
with giving them data and feedback on their tool.

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So if anybody is interested in that, let me know.
I'll also send you this e-mail after the meeting.
So are there any questions about
those two things?
(No response.)
MS. DEONARINE: Okay. Next --
moving along. So I did the community based social
marketing training last month. It was certainly
intense and it's a lot of work.
So I'm thinking maybe through our
water quality improvement plan, perhaps we can
identify something to do some public work on,
public education and changes -- it's meant to
change behavior so that people will adopt the
environmental changes we want to, like fertilizing
less or cleaning up after your dog, things like
that.
So I've got the training
information on that.
And so our last update was DEC
water quality monitoring. There's no updates on
that. We're going to extend the grant.
Director Bartolucci (phonetic) is
still working on our documents that we need with

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    the Department of Environmental Conservation to get
    our funding. Well, we have the funding but to get
    it reimbursed. So I'll keep you updated on that.
    And those are all my updates.
    FEMALE VOICE: Thank you.
    MS. DEONARINE: You're welcome.
    FEMALE VOICE: Sarah, were you on
    the call with the Western Aquifer this week?
    MS. DEONARINE: No.
    FEMALE VOICE: Okay. I was.
    They're still working on the water quality and the
    wells. And there's, you know, there's problems
    obviously. They're still -- they're going to issue
    some kind of a report but not immediately.
                            MS. DEONARINE: They're going to
    issue what?
    FEMALE VOICE: With the wells.
    The -- they're concerned about the nitrogen
    that's -- that's in the water.
    MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.
    FEMALE VOICE: So this is --
    they're -- salt water is seeping more into
    freshwater, is what they're finding. More than
    they thought.
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    MR. BRAUN: Well, I don't -- is
    this the U.S. Geological study for the (Zoom
    inaudible) mostly in the Great Neck Peninsula?
    FEMALE VOICE: Yes.
    MR. BRAUN: Okay. I wasn't a part
    of that call but I'm aware of the issue.
    FEMALE VOICE: Yeah.
    MR. BRAUN: They've been studying
    it for years.
    FEMALE VOICE: Yes, it's an
    ongoing thing, I guess. You know, from what I can
    tell.
    MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. It's not
    just Great Neck. It's other places in Nassau
County too.
I missed that. That would have
been interesting.
Are there any updates or anything
happening around the watershed?
FEMALE VOICE: Manorhaven has a
new clerk. I just shot her new -- the contact info
over to you.
MS. DEONARINE: Thank you.
What is her or his name?
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    FEMALE VOICE: It's a her. And
    check your e-mail. I just sent it.
        (Laughter.)
        CHAIR KEANE: I know -- Joe passed
    this morning coming back from work today that North
    Hempstead, I think, is having a STOP program this
    weekend.
    FEMALE VOICE: Yes.
    MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
    CHAIR KEANE: Maybe we could put
    like a blurb on Facebook -- or blast --
    FEMALE VOICE: Already done that.
    CHAIR KEANE: You did that?
    Okay.
    FEMALE VOICE: Yeah.
    CHAIR KEANE: I don't go on
    Facebook every day -- so.
    FEMALE VOICE: I put it on
    Facebook and about six other Port Washington
    Facebook groups but for people in Manhasset,
    Plandome, those areas, if you have local groups it
    would be a good idea to post it there, Great Neck.
    CHAIR KEANE: STOP. It's stop
    throwing out hazardous pollutants. It's for like
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household pollutants or like if you've got an old
can of oil-based paint or an old bag of some sort
of chemical, you can bring it down there. They
take it. They dispose of it for you.
I don't know the last time they
had a STOP program. They also did paper shredding
and clothes donations.
FEMALE VOICE: Yes.
CHAIR KEANE: So I don't know if
that's on that docket as well.
FEMALE VOICE: I think I included
the link to the Town web page about it. I know
that they're not doing pharmaceuticals because
there's a different collection process for that
through the drug stores now.
FEMALE VOICE: What day is that
on? Is it tomorrow?
FEMALE VOICE: It's Saturday,
Sunday.
FEMALE VOICE: Is there a limit
how many --
FEMALE VOICE: At Bar Beach.
FEMALE VOICE: At Bar Beach. Is
there a limit how many paint cans?

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FEMALE VOICE: I don't think so.
But check the Town's website.
FEMALE VOICE: Okay.
CHAIR KEANE: And usually it's
latex-based paint. Latex-based paint, you can just
let them --

FEMALE VOICE: Yeah, you dry it
out.
CHAIR KEANE: -- dry it out and throw it in the garbage.

FEMALE VOICE: Okay.
CHAIR KEANE: But insecticides or
funky bottles you have in your garage, I think they do some batteries and monitors.

FEMALE VOICE: Yeah.
MS. DEONARINE: I just remembered three more things.

So with Town of North Hempstead, I think today was scheduled to begin -- their contractor was scheduled to begin dredging at Manorhaven Beach Town Park. So that will be done by the end of the year. But the parking lot will be used to de-water the dredge spoils until sometime in the spring. And then they're going

    to -- groups. things.
    the Island.

FEMALE VOICE: Yeah. They'd already set up jersey barriers in the parking lot and there was a lot of discussion as to what nefarious purpose they would be having on local

Nobody actually seemed to like the facts. They were more interested in inventing

MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
The other thing is, I would -- at Lee Pond, last week and they are still doing construction on Plandome Road there.

CHAIR KEANE: Right.

MS. DEONARINE: On the roadway and the culvert underneath. So I thought that would done by now but it's still going.

And that reminds me that the Nature Conservancy through like North Shore Land Alliance has hired a new young woman to do the outreach for the County septic replacement program.
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So it's been a long time coming but the County has
funding from the State to reach out to communities
where there are trouble areas with water quality to
remove cesspools and put in the innovative
alternative system.
So I met with her and she's kind
of be the expeditor for the County and for helping
people get their permits for their property. So I
met with her last week. I met her. She's new.
And I can't remember her name.
Kat something. I'll have to look it up.
MR. RICHARDSON: Can we get
her -- this is Don. Can we get her to appear --
participate in one of our meetings?
MS. DEONARINE: Yes, she would.
Yeah.
MR. BRAUN: Sarah, did you say
that was for Suffolk County?
MS. DEONARINE: If I did, I meant
Nassau County.
MR. BRAUN: Okay.
MS. DEONARINE: No, she's
working for Nassau County because Suffolk County
has a different setup than we are.

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So she's focused specifically on Nassau County.

MS. HAGERSEN: Sarah, with Baxter Beach, the project is going to be on hold for probably a year because Tony D'Orso (phonetic), our Assemblymember had put up -- was going to -- there was going to be an environmental bond this year on the -- for the election. And the bond is going to be pushed back until next year because of what's happened with the economy and COVID.

So our project right now is on
hold. We do have 3-D renderings from Cameron, which are terrific. And that's where we are right now with that.

MS. DEONARINE: Would that be
appropriate for Cameron, or for you, to present about that? I know I'm certainly interested. But I don't know if that's appropriate for the whole committee to look at what we're dealing with.

MS. HAGERSEN: I don't know. Let me just double check. But they've done a beautiful job with their renderings. And hopefully -hopefully this bond will be put up next year.

I was disappointed that it was not
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being put up this year. It was supposed to be.
And so we have to wait.
I also, by the way, if I can -- if
I have information on this aquifer study, I will
send it to you.
MS. DEONARINE: Thanks.
MS. HAGERSON: I'll get it from
Mindy.
MR. BRAUN: Nora, do you mean the
Bond Act?
MS. HAGERSEN: Say that again,
Kevin?
MR. BRAUN: Do you -- are you
talking about the Bond Act?
MS. HAGERSON: Yeah.
MR. BRAUN: The grant program,
not necessarily like a bond -- the Bond Act is a
grant program.
MS. DEONARINE: There was -- no,
there was a proposal for like a \$3 million Bond Act
but because of the State's economic situations due
to the Corona Virus, they're not -- it's being
pushed back.
MS. HAGERSON: Yeah. That's what
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I was told.
    MR. BRAUN: She's referring to it
as a bond. And I think that's what's throwing me
    off.
    MS. HAGERSON: That's what I was
    told that it was going to be -- it was not just for
    our beach, it was a whole environmental bond.
    MR. BRAUN: Yeah, it's the Bond
Act.

MS. HAGERSON: Right.
MR. BRAUN: The Bond Act got
pushed off. It's a grant fund that everybody can
get -- can go for.

MS. HAGERSON: Right.

MR. BRAUN: Or are you talking
about something specific where Tony D'Orso or the Assemblymember is putting money aside specifically for that?

MS. HAGERSON: Right.

MS. DEONARINE: I think it might have been both. Some grant programs and some specific projects.

MS. HAGERSON: Yeah. And ours was
going to be part of that. But like I said, it's
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been -- it's going to be delayed a year until they
put that up. That was my most recent information.
MS. DEONARINE: And D'Orso's not
running for re-election. So hopefully whoever
comes in will keep championing that.
MS. HAGERSON: Yes. We'll keep
our fingers crossed.
MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.
CHAIR KEANE: Any other municipal
updates?
(No response.)
CHAIR KEANE: No.
MR. BRAUN: Nothing to report from
the Town of North Hempstead.
CHAIR KEANE: All right then.
This might be our quickest meeting
ever.
MS. DEONARINE: Could be.
CHAIR KEANE: Unless there's
questions, otherwise I'll ask for a motion to
adjourn.
MS. DEONARINE: Two more things.
Our next meeting's November 12th. It's going to be
held by Zoom still.

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    And so on the ongoing beach
    cleanup, because they're not having a single
    volunteer event. So if you can get out with your
    family, take some data and let me know what you
    collect.
    MR. ARTEL: This is Mike Artel
    from Sands Point.
    I do have one quick update. We
    tried to put together a Sands Point Beach
    consortium. There are a bunch of different areas
    in Sands Point where we have access to the beach
    rights, depending on whether your house is deeded
    to it or whatnot.
    And there's probably 15 to 20
    different organizations. They all run separately
    and because of my involvement in this organization
    and, you know, intermunicipal, like people working
    together, the mayor said, hey, can you put
    together, can you try to coordinate all these beach
    associations so they can perhaps, you know, have
    some sort of synergy or have economies of scale or
    learn from each others mistakes and so on and so
    forth.
                            So we had our first meeting and
