            CHAIR KEANE: I think Kevin's
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    coming in on his second call.
    MR. BRAUN: Yeah. I'm trying to
    be able to do the presentation but I don't have
    necessarily a microphone or video to be able to
    see. But I'm trying to see the presentation.
                            CHAIR KEANE: Okay.
                            MS. DEONARINE: So one thing I
    wanted to ask the committee members, when you make
    the motion, if you could read the whole motion for
    transcription.
            CHAIR KEANE: All right.
            I'm trying to, again, it won't --
    is it still being shared with the agenda?
    MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
    CHAIR KEANE: Oh, okay.
    Okay. Do we want to start with
    the first motion?
                            MS. DEONARINE: Yes. So this is
    to pay for the cost of transcription.
    CHAIR KEANE: From this one coming
        up or the last ones?
            MS. DEONARINE: This current,
        today.
            CHAIR KEANE: Okay.
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    MS. WILSON-PINES: I'll make a
    motion -- Jennifer Wilson-Pines made a motion to
    approve the meeting transcription by MGR Reporting
    at a cost of $4.45 per page, not to exceed $600.
    CHAIR KEANE: Do we have a
    MS. SHEEHAN: Diane Sheehan.
    And I'll second it.
    CHAIR KEANE: Okay.
    All those in favor?
    (Chorus of "ayes.")
    CHAIR KEANE: Oppose?
    (No response.)
    CHAIR KEANE: I see none.

    So then the second one would
    be -- do we have to go back and approve these
    minutes?
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approved the minutes of September 17th, 2020 but
then when I sent it to DOS to fund it, our Water
Quality Improvement Plan, they wanted -- they
didn't realize -- I knew they wanted their name and
information on the documents. I didn't realize it
included the meeting minutes.
    So I had to add -- I think it's at
the bottom of the first page, I had to add a
little, you know, document was prepared with
funding. This document was prepared with funding
provided by the New York State Department of State
under Title XI of the Environmental Protection
Fund, since it was our kickoff meeting for our
Water Quality Improvement Project.
    CHAIR KEANE: So that was the only
change to the minutes? Had we formally approved
those minutes?
    MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
    CHAIR KEANE: So then does
somebody want to make a motion to accept these
amended minutes to satisfy the requirements of the
New York State Department -- the New York State
Department o State?
                                    MS. WILSON-PINES: I'll make that
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motion.
CHAIR KEANE: Jennifer.

MS. WILSON-PINES: Jennifer
Wilson-Pines, to accept the amended version of the September minutes.

MR. BRAUN: Kevin Braun, Town of North Hempstead, will second that.

CHAIR KEANE: Sorry. I lost -sorry. I've got two screens. I lost the minutes here.

MS. DEONARINE: I don't think we need them.

MALE VOICE: Do you want to ask, all in favor?

CHAIR KEANE: Oh, I'm sorry. I
was -- so okay -- all those in favor of accepting the amended minutes?
(Chorus of "ayes.")
CHAIR KEANE: Oppose?
(No response.)
CHAIR KEANE: Abstain?
(No response.)
CHAIR KEANE: I see none.
So that motion carries.
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Thank you.
And then we need a motion to adopt the minutes for the last meeting. Does anyone need to see those?

MR. RICHARDSON: This is Don
Richardson from Plandome.

I'll make that motion to keep the
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MS. DEONARINE: No, no, wait.
CHAIR KEANE: Not yet, Don.
MR. RICHARDSON: -- at 2021.
CHAIR KEANE: Actually, Don, you're one step ahead of us.

MR. RICHARDSON: Oh, okay.
CHAIR KEANE: Don, it was this one.

MR. RICHARDSON: Oh.
CHAIR KEANE: So we had the minutes of October 15th. Does anybody need to see those? Has everybody looked at those?

These were the transcribed
minutes, Sarah?

MS. DEONARINE: No, these were the minutes I typed up. And it also includes
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another --
MS. WILSON-PINES: Okay. Yeah.
MS. DEONARINE: -- reference.
MS. WILSON-PINES: Open it up.
CHAIR KEANE: Is it still on
there? Can you see that?
MS. SHEEHAN: Yes.
CHAIR KEANE: So, Sarah, when you
transcribe these minutes of the meetings, what
happens to those transcriptions?
MS. DEONARINE: So I get them back
and I think I sent them all out to everyone. And
then I post it on line to our website. Did
everyone find where the minutes were posted? I
posted on the same page as our meeting minutes are
posted.
CHAIR KEANE: So the meeting
minutes are separate from the transcriptions?
MS. DEONARINE: Yes. I figured we
didn't need to approve those transcriptions.
CHAIR KEANE: I just didn't know if
the transcription were part of the minutes?
MS. DEONARINE: No, I sent --
usually I send the minutes to try and help the

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    transcriber.
    MR. BRAUN: Well, I'd like to
    make that motion then if we could.
    I'll make the motion, Kevin Braun,
    Town of North Hempstead, to adopt the meeting
    minutes from October 15th, 2020.
    CHAIR KEANE: Can \(I\) have a
    second?
        MR. RICHARDSON: Don Richardson
    in Plandome.
        I'll second that.
        CHAIR KEANE: Thank you.
        All those in favor?
        (Chorus of "ayes.")
        CHAIR KEANE: Oppose?
        (No response.)
        CHAIR KEANE: Abstain?
        (No response.)
        CHAIR KEANE: That motion carries
    too.
        MS. DEONARINE: Okay. I have an
    edit to the next motion. The request to keep the
    2021 dues at the same level as the 2020 dues, not
    2021.
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    Thanks to Dianne for catching

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    that.
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CHAIR KEANE: Okay.
MS. DEONARINE: And then I don't know if we have to say what each dues level is for the transcription -- if that's necessary. MR. BRAUN: No, I don't think we
need to do it. It's already included in other --
other meeting minutes what the dues are.

So I think just the motion of not -- not adopting new dues or keeping them at the same level is fine. You can put it in the meeting minutes, the meeting minutes are what we adopt.

MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
CHAIR KEANE: Does somebody want to make that motion to keep the dues the same as 2020 for 2021?

MS. SHEEHAN: Yeah.
Dianne --
MR. RICHARDSON: Go ahead.
MS. SHEEHAN: Dianne Sheehan.
I'll make the motion to keep the
2021 dues at the same level as 2020.
MR. RICHARDSON: I'm Don

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Richardson.
I'll second that.

CHAIR KEANE: Nora (sic) beat you
to the punch, Don.
Right. So we've got a second.
So I guess is there any
discussion?
(No response.)

CHAIR KEANE: All those in favor?
(Chorus of "ayes.")
CHAIR KEANE: Oppose?
(No response.)
CHAIR KEANE: Abstain?
(No response.)

CHAIR KEANE: Okay.
That motion carries as well.

MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
I wanted to also say that now that those dues are approved, we start our 60-day review period and under the IMA, during the 60-day review period, any member can choose to leave the committee without having to pay the 2021 dues.

And so the 60-day period ends on January 11th, 2021. And so if no one withdraws,

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the committee will vote to finalize these dues at
    the January 21st, }2020\mathrm{ meeting.
    And I'll send a letter out to all
    the members to let them know about this.
    CHAIR KEANE: Okay.
    MS. DEONARINE: And it's important
    so make sure you mark your calendars for January
    21st because we need a quorum to vote on this and,
    also, things pertaining to the inter-municipal
    agreement and possibly other items too if I get a
    lot of work done in the next two months.
    CHAIR KEANE: What was next on the
    agenda then, Sarah?
    MS. DEONARINE: I had put down
    tentative, the Seabin floating docking system and
    I'd like to discuss that with the committee, if
    we're up for that.
                            CHAIR KEANE: Okay.
                            MS. DEONARINE: So November 2nd I
    sent an e-mail out to the member representatives.
    Earlier -- it might have been the beginning of
    November, end of October the Seabin representative
    reached out to me and asked how the summer season
    had gone. So Seabin, as a reminder, is the
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floating trash bin that sucks water and trash into
    it. And we were not able to put it out this year
    because of COVID set back everything.
    One of the things was getting --
    the Town getting a contractor to fix the pilings
    that hold the floating kayak launch, which is where
    the Seabin was located. So when I told him that,
    then he responded with information about a system
    they have that makes this Seabin self floating.
    The cost is $1,905 -- so $1,905
plus shipping.
    He also suggested another system
called SlideMoor, which looks like it may be a
little cheaper but I did not look into these things
to assess ways -- I wanted to make sure the
committee would be interested in buying something
like that. It would definitely help with some
    headache we've had with finding a place to put the
    Seabin since we have such a huge tidal range.
    I think it would be a good thing
to pursue and look into.
    So we'll gather more information.
    CHAIR KEANE: But to remind the
    committee, the Seabin was paid for by a grant;
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correct?
    MS. DEONARINE: Yes. Yeah.
    CHAIR KEANE: So then anything
that we purchased now would be on our dime?
    MS. DEONARINE: Yes. And you're
    looking at over $2,000 for that.
    CHAIR KEANE: Again, could you
    just describe what each of these were in a couple
    of seconds -- or sentences.
    MS. DEONARINE: So the Seabin --
    CHAIR KEANE: I'm sorry. Maybe
    start with the problem then.
    MS. DEONARINE: So the problem is
    one -- there's only one floating dock we can
    currently use. And that was out of service due to
    a storm. And --
    CHAIR KEANE: And that was the
    kayak dock -- right at the Town dock?
    MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. And then
    there is the concern that it might not actually be
    deep enough there to hold the Seabin.
    And the committee is interested in
    leaving the Seabin at Town docks. There had been
    the suggestion to move it to Manor Haven Beach.
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But the committee had voted to leave it at the Town
    dock.
    So this would solve issues -- in
    theory solve issues with keeping it from getting
    stuck in the mud and just weighing down that
    floating dock.
            But we'd have more options where
    to put it around Town docks also.
    MR. RICHARDSON: That makes sense.
    If it gets stuck in the mud, I would think that
    would be a big expense.
    MS. DEONARINE: Yeah, they had to
    hire Mirren Marine to remove it.
        MR. RICHARDSON: Right.
        What, do we approve something more
    concrete at the next meeting, is that what you'd
    like to do?
        MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
        MR. RICHARDSON: Do you want me
    to look into these?
        MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. So I'm
    wondering if it's something the committee would
    consider. It is a huge expense. It just seems
    like the Seabin just keeps getting more and more
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expensive and complicated.
    FEMALE VOICE: I was going to ask
you, Sarah, did we ever put a cap on how much this
whole Seabin -- we would allow for expenses?
    I don't know, for some reason --
    MS. DEONARINE: We did but that
    was specifically for like buying a net and
    replacement parts and PVC piping.
    FEMALE VOICE: Okay.
    CHAIR KEANE: But, again, the
    purchase of the whole unit was paid for by a grant.
    FEMALE VOICE: I remember that.
    CHAIR KEANE: We paid for it --
    hopefully -- I don't know if we got reimbursed or
    not but --
    MS. DEONARINE: We didn't pay out
    of pocket. They paid for it.
    FEMALE VOICE: What are the
    dimensions of the Seabin again? I forget.
    MS. DEONARINE: It's really big.
    I have -- yeah -- well, not quite that big. It's
    like a garbage can --
    FEMALE VOICE: Okay.
        MS. DEONARINE: -- solid and
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really heavy.
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    FEMALE VOICE: Wasn't there a part
    that was stolen?
MS. DEONARINE: The filter net
that catches everything was stolen twice. So we
have locking mechanism that hopefully will work but
we haven't tried it out this year because it didn't
go out.

MR. RICHARDSON: It says on line
that it needs water depth of 1.2 meters, which I
guess is about four feet. So that's the minimum
requirement for depth.
MS. DEONARINE: I didn't chat much
with Mal Nathan about it. I sent him an e-mail and
he didn't really -- he didn't give much of a
response.
MR. RICHARDSON: Being new, I
don't have a handle on the budget and is that June
1 to June 1 or when -- what amount are we talking
about dipping into?
MS. DEONARINE: No, it would just
come out of the general budget. I can open that up
and let you know what the current budget is -- or
the current out is.

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    So last year, I did an accounting
    and if all of our expenses came out, we ran the
    risk of running low on our finances. But because
    of COVID, everything's been set back.
    So we do have a large amount of
    money in our account at the money, over $150,000.
    MR. RICHARDSON: I'm sorry?
    MS. DEONARINE: We currently have
    over $150,000.
    MR. RICHARDSON: Okay. And what
    are the expected expenses on that? What do we
    expect to spend or what do we want to spend?
    Could we get an update maybe at the next meeting or
    every quarter as to where we are on the budget and
    what expenses are planned or expected.
    CHAIR KEANE: Don, we did do
    that -- so.
        MR. RICHARDSON: Okay.
    CHAIR KEANE: Periodically.
    MR. RICHARDSON: Okay. Great.
    CHAIR KEANE: Unfortunately, you
    are new and, yes, you're coming in to ask a lot of
    good questions.
        MR. RICHARDSON: Yeah, I realize
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that.

CHAIR KEANE: I mean, I think we've had a surplus this year but we were also trying to save some of that for potential water quality plans but the expense of $\$ 2,000$ isn't so much that big of a deal, it's just a matter of, you know, is $\$ 2,000$ worth the Seabin thing that just keeps us, you know --

MR. RICHARDSON: Right.
CHAIR KEANE: -- and I guess -MS. DEONARINE: And I don't think
it's a definite but $I$ didn't want to put a lot of
effort into it without the committee's interest in
pursuing it.
MR. RICHARDSON: Well, the Seabin
has been of value; right?
MS. DEONARINE: Not currently.
MR. RICHARDSON: I'm sorry.
MS. DEONARINE: Not currently.
Not yet.
MR. RICHARDSON: Okay.
What is your expectation?
MS. DEONARINE: Well, the
expectation was that we'd have volunteers come out
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and sort trash and count it so we would have some
data about how much it's screening, at least for
the first couple of years.
    And Samantha was supposed to help
    with that and COVID stopped everything.
    MR. RICHARDSON: Right.
    MS. DEONARINE: And that -- it
    just shows that it does collect a lot. And it's
    something that we can maintain, trying to get other
    marinas or entities on board with putting more of
    them around the bay and across Long Island.
    CHAIR KEANE: So it's sort of a
    pilot study with -- was it Soil and Conservation?
    MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. Nassau
    County Soil -- Soil and Water.
    CHAIR KEANE: Soil, Erosion and
    Conservation -- whatever they are.
    So I don't know, do you need
    somebody to make a recommendation to -- to look
    into it a little bit.
    MR. BRUIN: Yeah. She doesn't
    need a recommendation, she just needs to go ahead
    and look more into and get the information to the
    committee.
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    CHAIR KEANE: I think when -- she said -- she was looking for somebody to say, are we interested in -- so I would say, yeah, we're interested in learning about what --

MS. WILSON-PINES: Right.
CHAIR KEANE: -- what it's going to do and what it's going to cost and the implication is that it's also becoming -- we don't know what's going to happen come next summer either.

MR. RICHARDSON: Right.
CHAIR KEANE: You know, I'm crossing my eyes and crossing my fingers that next summer we're back in business and Samantha, hopefully you won't be an intern, you'll be like a full-time employee someplace.

I don't know what year you're in but if you're not, then we'd love to have you sorting garbage.
(Laughter.)
CHAIR KEANE: I'm not saying that in any sort of mean way. I know this summer was just the point of not putting the kayaks back out, every for people who were kayaking, looking for

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things to do, you know, I'm not sure why that
wasn't put out there when people are still socially
distancing.
    MR. RICHARDSON: Do you need
    volunteers for this?
    MS. DEONARINE: Yes. Yeah, we
    will.
    MR. RICHARDSON: Okay.
    MS. DEONARINE: To get it up and
    running.
    And so we have partners, we
partnered with Soil and Water Conservation
District, obviously.
    Hofstra University set up a
volunteer like -- instructions for how to do the
    sorting and Residents Forward was helping collect
    volunteers and then everything fell apart.
    CHAIR KEANE: Right. And Samantha
    was going to be basically managing the whole
    project an coming up with the data and evaluating
    -- so.
    MR. RICHARDSON: Okay. I'm sure I
    can get some volunteers for you.
    MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
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                            MR. RICHARDSON: So when it's
    time, --
    CHAIR KEANE: Cool.
                            MR. RICHARDSON: -- I'll offer
    again.
        CHAIR KEANE: It's good that we
    started again.
        MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.
        CHAIR KEANE: All right.
        MS. DEONARINE: Hopefully in the
    beginning of the year.
        Okay. I'll keep looking into that
    then.
        FEMALE VOICE: So this is -- this
    is how I feel about this. I feel that we should
    invest the $2,000 but I think we need to keep an
    eye on how much this is actually going to cost us
    in another year or two.
        MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
        FEMALE VOICE: That's just my
    opinion.
        MR. BRUIN: Kevin Bruin from the
    Town. I would suggest that maybe we get the
        information first before we go ahead and spend
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$2,000.
    So if Sarah's looking for somebody
    from the committee or people from the committee to
    say, go ahead and get us some information, that's
    what I think she's looking for right now.
    CHAIR KEANE: Right.
    MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.
    CHAIR KEANE: I think at the next
    meeting if you can kind of describe the situation
    to us again about the current configuration and
    then what the two potential options are, maybe a
    couple of handouts or cut sheets of whatever --
        MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
        CHAIR KEANE: -- and then we can
    kind of --
        MR. BRUIN: Sounds good.
        CHAIR KEANE: -- weigh the
    advantages and disadvantages.
        Again, I think we had everything
    started to get set up for this summer to kind of be
    like a full summer and the summer didn't happen --
    so.
        MR. BRUIN: Right.
            CHAIR KEANE: So now we have a
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Seabin that's sort of sitting in dry dock.
    MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
    MR. BRUIN: Okay.
    CHAIR KEANE: So do we want to
move to the presentation or do we want to do
updates?
    Shall I stop the recording for the
    presentations?
    MS. DEONARINE: Maybe do updates
    real quick.
    The only update I have is that I
    submitted a water -- well, I sent a water quality
    -- sorry, I sent the quarterly report for our DEC
    water quality monitoring grant to Erick Swenson at
    Hempstead Harbor Protection Committee and he gets
    everybody together and submits it to Albany.
    We haven't started the process of
    requesting a grant extension but DEC already knows
    that we're going to do that -- so. So that should
    work.
    And then once we get -- I have not
    been able to get an answer from Dvirka and
    Bartilucci about our time line for getting the
    documents together that we need in order to start
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    spending money from the grant.
    Assuming that's done by the end of
    the year then next year will be a lot of purchasing
    things that we'er supposed to on the grant to drive
    it down.
    So it will be expensive hitting
    our account but then we'll get reimbursed by the
    State.
    We just have to make sure we --
    CHAIR KEANE: And our grant money
    is still secure even with COVID happening?
    MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
    CHAIR KEANE: Thank you.
    MS. DEONARINE: It's just slow
    moving. Everything's slow moving.
    CHAIR KEANE: Right.
    MR. RICHARDSON: Sorry to ask but
    when -- when do you have the budget planning and
    what is the fiscal year?
    MS. DEONARINE: We go by the
    calendar year.
    MR. RICHARDSON: Okay.
    MS. DEONARINE: And usually it's
    actually -- like a meeting like this for -- where
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we set the dues. But I gave an accounting at the
last meeting of our financial standing and
nothing's currently happening because of COVID so
we didn't need to change our dues at all.
And the hope is if we can build up
enough capital, then we won't risk the possibility
of running out of money when we start expending
things for grants for our DEC water quality
monitoring grants and for the DOS water quality
improvement project grant.
MR. RICHARDSON: Okay.
MS. DEONARINE: Those are both
reimbursement grants and we have to put out the
money and then it comes back eventually.
MR. RICHARDSON: When does the
committee approve the budget for 2021?
MS. DEONARINE: We've never really
done any budget approvals. I just go over the
budget.
MR. RICHARDSON: Okay.
MS. DEONARINE: But we approved a
budget a couple of years ago and --
MR. BRUIN: Don, this is Kevin
with the Town of North Hempstead.

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    MR. RICHARDSON: Yes, Kevin.
    MR. BRUIN: Just know that the
    budget is not a fixed item like it is on a Town
    Board of a Village calendar.
    The -- the money is very fluid and
    everything has to get approved by the committee.
So budgeting item doesn't really work because it
varies so much.
I mean we have a basic idea of
what our, you know, the money we pay Sarah. But
then other projects come and go. So us setting a
budget --
MR. RICHARDSON: Okay.
MR. BRUIN: -- is never an item
that works. You know, we really set -- we've done
it before but it's not like every item that comes
before Manhasset Bay Protection Committee has to be
approved by the committee.
MR. RICHARDSON: Okay.
MR. BRUIN: So were you or the
Village or a Town would approve a budget, we,
because of the small nature of the committee, just
approve certain specific items.
MR. RICHARDSON: Okay.
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MR. BRUIN: So it's more closely monitored than it would be if we just set a general budget.

MR. RICHARDSON: That's helpful.
Thank you.
CHAIR KEANE: Yeah. And just to add, you know, our annual dues are about \$53,000 from the Town, the County and the Villages. We generally don't spend that much money that year and then we've had some accumulate over time and I think we just got two checks or hopefully we're getting a second check from the County for another \(\$ 24,000\).

So -- so we have some money but we just -- I don't remember what the total potential pay out for the water quality plan, that was 160 -MS. DEONARINE: Yes. Including --
more than that 167,168 --

CHAIR KEANE: Right. And part of that was our payment of that too. So we were trying to -- and we just increased our dues for the first time this past year and that was the first time in what, 20 years?

MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.
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CHAIR KEANE: So -- all right.
I think that's enough discussion.
Any other updates or municipal
updates?

MS. HAAGENSON: We have one for
Baxter. The bond which was -- we were looking forward to that was going to be put up by the State to do some renovation of Baxter Beach was pulled from the election this year. The hope is that it will be back on next year. And that was pulled because of the funding that, you know, was missing from the State.

So everything has been put on hold for at least a year. I'm hoping that it will come forward.

The other thing that is happening is the gabion wall which the County put in, probably 30 years ago at the -- near the beach, right there, the bottom cage is slowly but surely crumbling.

I've spoken to the County. I've spoken to the Sewer District. We'll see what happens. That's what's going on in Baxter. CHAIR KEANE: Thank you, Nora.
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Any other municipal updates?
MR. BRUIN: Yes, one from Kevin

Bruin, the Town of North Hempstead.
Our dredging has commenced at Manor Haven Beach Park. I haven't gotten down there to see it because of the -- because of (Zoom inaudible) they're working on mostly. But I know they started and \(I\) know it's progressing fast.

Hopefully they will have some more information provided at the next meeting to tell you what exactly is going on.

CHAIR KEANE: That's good news.

I saw them set up all the jersey barriers and everything else. So a lot of the dredging is progressing.

MS. DEONARINE: That reminded me of something else.

The water -- the water -- now I can't think of what it's called, the WAC, Water Advisory -- Waterfront Advisory Committee --

MR. BRUIN: Waterfront Advisory
Committee.

MS. DEONARINE: -- at its meeting
next Monday night by Zoom and it's open to the
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public if anybody wants to attend, I'll get that
information.
CHAIR KEANE: Okay.
MS. DEONARINE: Scott, have you
been watching room making sure --
SCOTT: I have. It's still been
1 6 ~ p e o p l e .
MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
CHAIR KEANE: So is somebody else
coming besides Jill?
MS. DEONARINE: Possibly Dan.
CHAIR KEANE: Okay.
MS. DEONARINE: Maybe.
CHAIR KEANE: If Dan does come on,
we'll have Nora give her spiel again about the
gabion wall.
MS. HAAGENSON: We can try.
CHAIR KEANE: All right.
MR. BRUIN: Hang on, Bob.
Just to add a little bit to
Nora --
MS. HAAGENSON: Yes.
MR. BRUIN: -- Nora, I don't know
if you would be talking to the Water Pollution
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Control District about the gabion baskets, that is
purely a County thing if I remember correctly.
They installed them.
MS. HAAGENSON: That's correct.
And what I was told is that because the sewer pipes
run under there so there's some kind of dispute
shall we say between the Sewer District and the
County over this.
So that's where we are.
MR. BRUIN: Yeah, there always is
when somebody else is trying to get somebody else
to pay. But it's a County job.
MS. HAAGENSON: Sounds good to me,
Kevin.
(Laughter.)
CHAIR KEANE: We'll remind Dan of
his duties once he's arrived.
MS. HAAGENSON: Yes. And he has
come to see that.
CHAIR KEANE: I know he has.
MS. HAAGENSON: Quite some time
ago but he has come there. He could come again and
it's worse.
CHAIR KEANE: I know. I know.
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And we gave Dan a nice little plaque saying, thank
you all for your help. So we'll have to remind him
of that nice plaque we gave him.
(Laughter.)
CHAIR KEANE: All right.
I said we wanted to make this
meeting fast. So -- so I think I'm going to stop
the recording again and then we're going to have a
presentation; is that correct, Sarah?
MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
There weren't any other updates,
were there?
Okay.
(Off the record - special
presentation.)
CHAIR KEANE: We are back after
our presentation from nitrogen producing septic
tanks and right now, I guess, what's on the agenda
left?
The next meeting --
MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. Make sure
you mark your calendar for January 21st. We're
going to need a quorum to vote on things.
And then don't forget instead of
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our annual beach cleanup, we're encouraging people
to do their own beach cleanup through the end of
the year and to submit data directly to me.
So spread the word.
CHAIR KEANE: And there is no
December meeting?
MS. DEONARINE: That is correct.
Our next meeting is January 21st.
CHAIR KEANE: Okay.
MS. DEONARINE: Have a great
holiday season.
Happy Thanksgiving.
FEMALE VOICE: You too.
Thank you.
CHAIR KEANE: So with that, does
somebody want to make a motion to adjourn?
MR. RICHARDSON: I'll make a
motion.
Always glad to do that.
CHAIR KEANE: All right.
(Laughter.)
CHAIR KEANE: Don's the new man
for all the motions.
So thank you everybody for coming.
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VOICES: Thank you.
CHAIR KEANE: And we'll see you
in January.
Enjoy your weekend.
