3	MS. DEONARINE: So welcome to
4	the September 17th Manhasset Bay Protection
5	Committee meeting.
6	Just as a reminder, we are holding
7	this public meeting over Zoom in accordance with
8	the Governor's Executive Order 202, that allows us
9	to have meetings virtually in light of the novel
10	Corona Virus.
11	So a reminder that we are being
12	recorded and it will be transcribed, which is in
13	accordance with he Executive Order so I think even
14	though we don't have everyone here yet, we should
15	go around do introductions.
16	Please say and spell your name
17	and, also, mention if you're a designating
18	representative and who you are representing.
19	So I'll go first. I am Sarah
20	Deonarine, S-a-r-a-h, D-e-o-n-a-r-i-n-e. And I am
21	the Executive Director of Manhasset Bay Protection
22	Committee.

23 CHAIR KEANE: And I am Bob Keane.

I am from Port Washington North. K-e-a-n-e. And I

am the Chairman.

2	MR.	HERBERT:	I	am	Raymond
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- 3 Herbert, H-e-r-b-e-r-t, representative from the
- 4 Village of Plandome.
- 5 MS. MONOSON: I'm Jill Monoson,
- 6 M-o-n-o-s-o-n. And I'm the representative from the
- 7 Village of Thomaston.
- 8 MR. MALLOY: I'm Michael Malloy,
- 9 the Village of Baxter Estates, M-a-l-l-o-y.
- 10 MR. KLYCE: I'm Steve Klyce. I'm
- 11 a guest. I'm not a member but I'm a member of the
- 12 Town of North Hempstead Waterfront Advisory
- Committee and I like to stay in touch with groups
- 14 like this.
- MS. WILSON-PINES: I'm Jennifer
- 16 Wilson-Pines, W-i-l-s-o-n hyphen P-i-n-e-s,
- 17 representative for the Village of Manorhaven.
- 18 MR. BRAUN: I guess me next. I
- 19 can't hear. I can't see you guys. So this is
- 20 Kevin Braun, B-r-a-u-n, with the Planning
- 21 Department, North Hempstead.
- MS. HOLAK: And this Irene Holak,
- 23 H-o-l-a-k, with the Department of State.
- I'm also the program -- for the
- 25 project manager for this contract.

- 3 She's trying to connect to audio.
- 4 MR. DEVANEY: And this is Tom
- 5 Devaney, with the Town of North Hempstead and the
- 6 grants, D-e-v-a-n-e-y.
- 7 MS. DEONARINE: Thank you.
- 8 CHAIR KEANE: We saw Annie
- 9 Mendelson, who is from Great Neck, who's trying to
- 10 connect to audio somehow. That's what that thing's
- 11 showing me.
- 12 FEMALE VOICE: Yeah.
- MS. DEONARINE: I see the same
- 14 thing.
- So in light of not currently
- having a quorum, we are going to just skip ahead to
- 17 the discussion of our Water Quality Improvement
- 18 Plan grant that we have with the Department of
- 19 State.
- Irene, I can't remember what we
- 21 decided. Are you going to introduce it or --
- MS. HOLAK: Sure. I could. So
- 23 this -- this grant is contract No. C1001335. It is
- 24 considered Manhasset Bay Quality Improvement Plan
- 25 with the Department of State.

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2	And we recently had it executed so
3	that's exciting for the community to get going on
4	this. So I have the start date as February 1st,
5	2020 and the end date is January 31st, 2025.
6	The total award amount was
7	\$166,677. And of that, the State has \$125,000 for
8	funds available in match for the community or
9	\$41,667. So that's the award and cost share for
10	this particular project and our time line.
11	And I had read the project
12	description but it's always fun and exciting to
13	hear how projects develop. And I was wondering if
14	you guys could share a little bit of the grant
15	project history and background for my background in
16	understanding how this project came to fruition
17	but, also, to give me a little bit more background
18	on this project.
19	MS. DEONARINE: Okay. So I can
20	give some of the background and people who have
21	been here longer can fill in.
22	So the committee was formed in the
23	late '90s in an effort in realizing that it was
24	better to work together to protect and restore
25	Manhasset Bay than to do individual projects.

2	So the first item that the
3	committee went out for was a grant with the
4	Department of State against the Water Quality
5	Improvement Plan, which was published in 1999.
6	Since then some of those projects have been done.
7	Also, a lot has changed. We now
8	have the Phase 2 Stormwater Permit. There's more
9	regulatory things going on. Some projects weren't
10	completed and we still have bacteria issues in the
11	Bay, which is what we are which is our
12	containment of concern for the Bay is bacteria.
13	So I think moving forward we
14	wanted another blueprint. It's been over 20 years,
15	another idea what projects the committee can move
16	forward on beyond just our public education and
17	then trying to piecemeal little projects. We
18	wanted a big, overarching, this is what we really
19	need to focus on to get things done.
20	Also, we recognize that with a
21	plan in place it will be easier to pursue funding
22	and help us in getting projects done.
23	CHAIR KEANE: So let me just
24	describe who the Manhasset Bay is. I mean,
25	obviously, everyone knows but, you know, one town,

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2	was it 14 villages 13 villages that's around the
3	watershed. So, you know, it's an eclectic group
4	of, you know, different villages, different
5	ordinances, different things. But we're trying to
6	come together as one, you know, towards the common
7	goal of protecting the Bay.
8	MS. DEONARINE: So, you know,
9	there's no one group that's in charge. It's
10	considered an equal partnership (Zoom inaudible)
11	and the Town of North Hempstead and 13 villages in
12	the watershed. Some of them don't even have
13	waterfront but they all contribute to the water
14	quality in Manhasset Bay.
15	So there's no one voice for the
16	committee so if there's anything moving forward
17	that needs to be decided on, what I do the
18	day-to-day functions of the committee and we can
19	have meetings and we can talk about certain things.
20	And if there's anything that needs to be changed
21	that's substantial, we'll have to bring it before
22	the committee with a quorum of at least eight and
23	have them vote on it.

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Do you need any other --

MS. HOLAK: No, that's it. That's

ood.

- 3 Yeah, I think there's a lot of
- 4 water quality issues in the area so it's really
- 5 good and I'm happy to see that you guys are coming
- 6 together to work on this. So that's really good.
- 7 So the other thing I wanted to go
- 8 over is just some of the contract tasks and
- 9 requirements in recording. And I think the best
- 10 way to do that is to just kind of go over the
- 11 contract. And I'm not sure if everyone has the
- work plan in front of them but hopefully I can just
- go through this clearly.
- 14 So part of the -- the contract
- 15 is --
- 16 CHAIR KEANE: I'm sorry, Irene,
- just to pause for one second. But you want -- does
- somebody have a copy that they want to share and
- 19 post and then if Steve wanted to like to talk
- amongst the Zoom call, would that be helpful or it
- 21 doesn't matter?
- MS. HOLAK: Yeah, that would be
- 23 helpful.
- I don't have a digital copy with
- 25 me on hand. I'm actually not at home.

2 MS. DEONARINE: I can bring that

3 up.

4 MS. HOLAK: Okay.

5 Thanks, Sarah.

MS. DEONARINE: Now how do I share

7 it? I'll figure that out.

10 MS. DEONARINE: I'm the host now.

11 Okay -- for the moment.

12 Oh, screen share. Okay.

13 CHAIR KEANE: Yes, screen share.

14 Then it will ask you what window do you want to

16 whatever active window you have open. And it

should share that and then we all get shrunk to the

18 side or top.

MS. DEONARINE: Okay.

20 CHAIR KEANE: Oh, there you go.

MS. DEONARINE: It's not showing

22 me what -- all right. It's not showing me what

you're looking at. Just to make sure your looking

24 at -- does it say work plan and cover sheet at the

25 top?

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2	CHAIR KEANE: Yes.
3	MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
4	All right.
5	Is there a particular page you
6	want me to go to, Irene?
7	MS. HOLAK: Yeah, no, just go to
8	the next page. Yeah.
9	MS. DEONARINE: So things have
10	changed because the project manager is no longer
11	Kate Holger. That is switched over to you?
12	MS. HOLAK: Yes. Right. And so
13	that's something that we are we could change but
14	it's in process. It's just going to take a little
15	bit of time to get that updated.
16	MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
17	MS. HOLAK: Yeah. So I actually
18	got this project after it was given to Kate. We
19	had reshuffling in our unit and I've been taking
20	over some Long Island projects and Kate has been
21	put on more North Country projects. So I was given
22	this project. But we could update that. That's
23	not a problem.

MS. DEONARINE: Okay.

MS. HOLAK: Check on that.

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2	So the first section starts off
3	with the project description of what this project
4	will be. And I'm not going to go through that but
5	essentially it's for the Water Quality Improvement
6	Plan and it discusses the goal and essentially
7	that's what we're going off of for the rest of
8	tasks in the project.
9	The second section in a nutshell
10	just discusses that if there's any printed material
11	or some type of event publication or other sort,
12	that some type of acknowledgement an attribution is
13	given to the Department of State. So that
14	italicized statement is what we're looking for.
15	So you would just fill in what the document report
16	map, sign, whatever it may be, so that it provides
17	the attribution.
18	And if you scroll down
19	MS. DEONARINE: I also just as
20	an aside, I wanted to point out that the work plan
21	elements that were appropriate are also included in
22	the RFP so that we're sending out to hire a
23	contractor. So the RFP is pretty much this work
24	plan plus the format that says whatever the

template said, Town of North Hempstead uses.

MR. BRAUN: That's what it's

- 3 posted for.
- 4 MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. And we'll
- 5 be voting on that tonight.
- 6 MS. HOLAK: Great.
- 7 MR. BRAUN: I'm sorry, Sarah, did
- 8 you say we're voting on the work plan tonight?
- 9 MS. DEONARINE: No, we're voting
- 10 on the RFP tonight?
- MR. BRAUN: Oh, okay.
- MS. DEONARINE: The work plan's
- 13 already been voted on.
- MR. BRAUN: No, no, I figured. I
- just didn't understand. Yeah.
- MS. HOLAK: Then if we scroll
- down, it talks about compliance of procurement
- 18 requirements, which has been administered which
- 19 this basically says that an attorney or a legal
- 20 officer of a financial administrator of the
- 21 municipality is going to certify in writing that
- 22 the department -- to the department that applicable
- 23 provisions of the General Municipal Law were fully
- 24 complied with. And usually we have like a
- 25 procurement certification or some version that

1 2 indicates that from the municipality. The next section is when we 3 discuss tasks of the project, this is the project 4 5 components. So this is the section 4 of the contract. 6 So task 1 is the project's initial meeting, which we're holding right now. And the way that this is set up is to allocate what the 9 task is and then there's a product that needs to 10 11 be submitted to the Department of State to 12 establish that that task has been completed. And what we're looking for, all these tasks, and I 13 14 believe there's -- let's see --15 MS. DEONARINE: Twenty-four tasks. 16 MS. HOLAK: Yeah, 24 tasks that 17 will need to be completed for this grant to be 18 considered completed and -- and finalized. 19 20 set up is the initial project meeting, which we're

So the first, I guess the way it's set up is the initial project meeting, which we're holding where we're discussing the grant, the requirements and such. And then the product would be a written summary outlining agreements or an executive summary of what we discussed and the outcomes of -- of the meeting, which usually could

2	be,	vou	know.	summary	or	minutes	of	that,	as	lona

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- 3 as it discusses what the outcomes of the meeting
- 4 would be.
- 5 The next task is the Watershed
- 6 Advisory Committee. So all that we would require
- 7 is a list, a finalized list, of the members. In
- 8 this particular plan, there's an IMA, so Intra
- 9 Municipal Agreement, that would have to also be
- sent to us to establish that tasks to be completed
- and we understand that over time members change, so
- 12 we would just need an updated list if those do
- 13 change.
- MS. DEONARINE: So we have
- 15 completed task 2; correct?
- MS. HOLAK: Yes. We have those
- saved and it's filed. And I don't have it in front
- of me but I think I do have an Intra Municipal
- 19 Agreement and I think if not, I think that was sent
- 20 to me by Kate. So I believe I have that. But if
- 21 not, I could reach out.
- MS. DEONARINE: All right.
- 23 Yep.
- 24 MS. HOLAK: And then the next task
- 25 is a procurement of consultants. So that kind of

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2	ties into the task for in 5, which all tie into,
3	you know, having an RFP, if it's published in a
4	local newspaper or on the New York Contract
5	Reporter or other means of publication, we would
6	just ask for a copy of that.
7	Sometimes that's not applicable
8	for communities and if not, then we we don't
9	hold you accountable for that. So that may not be
10	applicable. In this case, I don't think it is.
11	Task 4 and 5 is establishing an
12	RFP, which I have looked at, reviewed and gave
13	comment to and provided back to Sarah, I believe.
14	And once that RFP is finalized, we
15	would just ask for a copy of that. And once the
16	contract and a consultant is secured, we would just
17	need the executed subcontract. And that's task 5.
18	And generally, we kind of loop
19	those three or two tasks together because they're
20	kind of together and simultaneously I guess very
21	connected.
22	Some communities have multiple
23	consultant or applicants so they usually send us

So we would just ask for that if that was

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how they decided on the one that they had selected.

1 2 applicable, it's not always. For this grant, I'm not sure if that's applicable. 3 The sixth task is the preparation 4 5 of a community outreach and participation plan. So that would just be an outreach plan that would be 6 submitted for our review. We would provide 7 comments and then send them back and then this would just be essentially that plan to complete 9 10 that task. 11 And in this paragraph that outlines what we're looking for and have agreed to 12 13 for -- for the plan with the purpose of enhancing 14 public understanding of the water planning project 15 and to encourage early and continued public 16 participation in selecting, designing and 17 implementing good management measures. 18 And in this particular paragraph, 19 it does indicate a summary of each public outreach session shall be made available in written form or 20 21 through other public appropriate means, such as 22 websites. So given the fact that we're in this

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pandemic and a lot of meetings are held virtually,

if the meetings are posted on a website, you could

just send a website that allocates the dates and

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- where we could find the recording. That's also
- 3 sufficient.
- 4 And this is also tied into project
- 5 meetings. So every time there's a committee
- 6 meeting that's related to this project, or other
- 7 project meetings related to this particular
- 8 project, if there's a recording or minutes that are
- 9 posted on the website, that would be substantial.
- 10 If you were just to send that website to us and let
- 11 us know that there's been a meeting and here's the
- 12 minutes.
- I could obtain that and say that
- 14 are two are filed. That might also save time. I do
- 15 know that it's difficult sometimes to send
- documents or other materials electronically and I
- 17 also have a drop box so that's also an option if we
- want to share documents that way.
- But particularly for 6, we're just
- looking for the outreach plan and meetings related
- 21 to that.
- 22 So task 7 is the second project
- 23 meeting. So this would be held with folks from
- 24 the -- the Watershed Advisory Committee with the
- 25 consultant. So that particular meeting DOS is not

1 2 necessarily required. I would be more than happy just to come and attend. DOS would not have an 3 agenda per se. We would just be there for 4 5 questions or just being a participant. But for this particular task, like all meetings, we would 6 just require minutes and summaries of the 7 agreements that have been reach from that -- from 9 that meeting. 10 We also require subsequent 11 meetings, and I'm not sure if it's explicitly stated in this particular project but we -- we do 12 like to see that this project and meetings 13 14 associated with this project to continue on. It 15 doesn't necessarily have to be a monthly basis but 16 when it's appropriate or when, you know, the 17 committee feels that it's appropriate to re-address 18 or meet, that would be sufficient just to send 19 minutes for that. 20 I'm going to take a quick break 21

- and ask if there's any questions. We've covered a
- bit so far. 22
- 23 MR. BRAUN: Yeah, Irene, this is
- Kevin with the Planning Department. 24
- 25 In regards to the -- the posting

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- in Newsday or the Contract Reporter, we generally
- 3 just put it on our website as, you know, put it on
- 4 our website the RFP and that in the past was
- 5 approved to ahead so we didn't have to pay for the
- 6 fees of publishing in Newsday or anything like
- 7 that.
- 8 MS. HOLAK: So you would --
- 9 MR. BRAUN: Is that still
- 10 acceptable?
- MS. HOLAK: -- just send the --
- 12 the website to where it's posted and we would --
- MR. BRAUN: Right.
- MS. HOLAK: -- we would say that.
- MR. BRAUN: Right. So that's
- 16 acceptable?
- MS. HOLAK: Yes.
- MR. BRAUN: Okay.
- 19 MS. HOLAK: If it's posted
- 20 elsewhere, that's -- you could also send the
- 21 website too if it's shared. So, yeah, that's still
- 22 fine, Kevin.
- MR. BRAUN: Thank you.
- MR. HERBERT: It's Ray Herbert
- 25 from Plandome.

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- 3 the award again, the total award -- grant?
- 4 MS. HOLAK: So it's \$166,677. So
- 5 we break it off into match and State. So for
- 6 match, it's \$41,667 and the State funds is
- 7 \$125,000.
- 8 MR. HERBERT: Okay. Great.
- 9 Thank you very much.
- MS. HOLAK: Yep.
- MS. DEONARINE: Our match is made
- 12 up of like salary of myself and Kevin and some
- other in the Town also are all volunteer hours. So
- 14 all the time you guys spend reviewing any documents
- or in this meeting and there is some cash reporting
- 16 towards that also.
- 17 MR. HERBERT: Okay.
- MS. HOLAK: Okay. So to continue
- 19 on. So task 8 is initial vision and watershed
- 20 goals.
- 21 So what we're looking for is the
- 22 draft of the initial vision statement, goals and
- objectives to be submitted to DOS. That could be,
- you know, a PDF, a PowerPoint presentation that
- 25 allocates that slide, different versions so that we

- 2 could see what the draft has been developed from
- 3 this project.
- 4 And then task 9 goes into
- 5 description and assessment of the water bodies and
- 6 watershed resources. So this is going to be a
- 7 narrative of some kind that will highlight the --
- 8 there's many bullet points that are within that
- 9 section.
- 10 So we would be looking at a
- 11 written assessment and description of some sorts
- 12 that would support and have included what these,
- 13 not all but a good portion of what's relevant, in
- 14 this bullet point list. And we would encourage and
- 15 really would like to see maps, tables, graphics
- that would be included preferably in GIS format or
- others acceptable with the Department of State.
- 18 We do use Microsoft Office, Excel.
- 19 So if things are submitted in that format, we also
- 20 will be able to open that.
- So, again, this is more of a
- 22 written narrative.
- 23 We will accept PDFs but any draft
- it's a lot easier for our department to work in
- Word. So if that's an option to provide something

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2	in a Word document that easier for us to do track
3	changes, but not necessarily required.
4	Task 10 is the description and
5	assessment of the ability of local law and programs
6	to implement best management practices to protect
7	water quality. And this, again, has many
8	requirements that will assess, you know, strengths
9	and gaps and the ability to go forward to manage
10	pollution.
11	There is an assessment management,
12	or assessment manual, that is listed in the work
13	plan that could be very helpful. So I would really
14	recommend looking at that document. And, again,
15	looking at the bullet points in submitting this
16	draft to the State.
17	So we would like to see, and
18	again, a written narrative of this in in its
19	draft form and we will provide comments.
20	Task 11 is the draft watershed
21	characterization report, which is essentially what
22	the product would be. So, again, we would just

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require the result of that characterization report

there is in that paragraph, which includes maps and

and the description of what we're looking for in

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2	other data that describes physical, biological,
3	ecological conditions of lakes, rivers, streams,
4	wetlands and upland portions.
5	Task 12 is the first public
6	participation outreach meeting. Again, given our
7	times, Zoom calls are more than likely, or some
8	type of virtual meeting, is more than likely what
9	will be happening. So we would just need some type
10	of summarization or an outline of what, you know,
11	decisions or agreements have come out of that
12	meeting including, you know, any presentations or
13	handouts that had been part of that presentation.
14	You are more than welcome to send,
15	if it's listed on the website of a municipality,
16	you could send that to us and we could download the
17	presentation and handouts from that. But we still
18	would need some type of quick executive summary of
19	what was what was done and the outcomes of that.
20	Task 13 is refinement of visions
21	and watershed goals. So, again, we would need some
22	type of narrative that is different from the
23	original draft that's sent to us that shows there
24	has been some refinement to the statement goals and

objectives.

2	And task 14 is the final watershed
3	characterization report. Again, we're looking for
4	some type of modification from the original draft
5	that has been sent to us.
6	Task 15 is the watershed
7	management recommendations to achieve goals and
8	objectives. So this is broken up into A and B. So
9	for this particular task, we might be looking at a
10	little bit more for products.
11	So the first one looks at, for A,
12	it looks like identifying and description of the
13	management strategies and recommendations that are
14	a part of this particular task, so we are looking
15	at a number of regulatory programmatic actions and
16	other projects. So the particular product for that
17	would be some type of narrative, again, written
18	description identifying some of these
19	recommendations, strategies and other projects to
20	basically improve water quality, habitat,
21	protection and restoration.
22	So for this particular project, we
23	would need both that product and the product of B.
24	And B looks at fire typing, recommended projects
25	and actions to keep maps. So we would just need to

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2	keep some type of list to achieve that task.
3	15B, that would indicate what the
4	priorities are, including maps and photos.
5	Are there any questions so far?
6	(No response.)
7	MS. HOLAK: Okay.
8	Task 16, would be the second
9	public participation outreach meeting. So that,
10	again, I'm assuming we'll be virtual because that
11	seems to be our more and more our new reality.
12	Again, same thing. If there's a
13	website that has a presentation or handouts, you
14	can provide that website. We can download it or
15	you can submit it through an e-mail.
16	And, again, we would need some
17	type of summary or minutes from that meeting.
18	Task 17 is the watershed
19	management recommendation report. So for that,
20	again, we would need a narrative of that report.
21	For this particular task, we would have the draft.
22	So the initial draft of the report and we would
23	work with everyone that wants to be involved to

report, that task will be completed.

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finalize that report. And once we have a finalized

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2	Task 18 looks oh, I skipped
3	one. No, no. Task 18, implementation, strategy
4	and schedule.
5	So that, again, we're looking for
6	a draft and final of the strategy and schedule
7	report, including the information that is in with
8	this paragraph. Again, there is a guidebook,
9	Watershed Plans, Protecting and Restoring Water
10	Quality on Watershed Planning, chapter 5.
11	If there is difficulty in
12	accessing that, I would be more than happy to
13	provide that and share that with everyone also.
14	So we'll be working with you to
15	achieve the draft.
16	We really would like to see a
17	number of projects and goals and actions ranging
18	from short term to long term; long term being five
19	years or more, so a variety of components.
20	So whatever's appropriate for the
21	community as you all are more experts on this can
22	delineate what is appropriate for the prioritizing

strategy and schedule.

the projects to come up with the implementations

But I just wanted to point out, we

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- 2 would like to see diversity. So not just only
- 3 short term and only long term, but a mix.
- 4 Task 19 is the draft watershed
- 5 management plan. So, again, this is kind of tying
- 6 everything together. We have an outline in here
- 7 that has more of a template of what we're looking
- 8 for.
- 9 So we're looking for six main
- 10 sections. So an executive summary, introduction,
- 11 characterization, watershed management
- 12 recommendation, implementation strategy, monitoring
- 13 and tracking.
- 14 So those six components will make
- up the watershed management plan. And, again, once
- 16 we have a draft that will -- that will be
- 17 essentially the product for that task.
- And in following suit, once you
- 19 have a draft, you would need public input so test
- 20 20 is the third public participation outreach
- 21 meeting.
- I would love to be a part of that
- or at least hear the public participation on that
- one. But, again, we're not required -- DOS is not
- 25 required but, again, I just would be interested in

2	that	$on \circ$
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- 3 So, again, this one, like all the
- 4 other public participation, we would just need some
- 5 type of summary or minutes of that. If it's
- 6 easier, a website so we can download the
- 7 presentation or handout.
- 8 And then we're slowly, after all
- 9 these tasks are done, we're slowing wrapping up the
- 10 contract.
- 11 So 21 would the finalized
- 12 watershed management plan. And, again, we will
- work with you to make that finalized. And that's
- 14 simply that product. So we would have a finalized
- 15 plan.
- 16 So task 22, 23 and 24 wrap up
- 17 the project. Throughout the grant, we would like
- 18 to see the MWBE reporting. I'm not sure if
- 19 everyone -- I'm not sure, Sarah, do you know that
- there's a New York Contract system? Are you
- 21 familiar with that?
- MS. DEONARINE: Yes, I am.
- MS. HOLAK: Okay.
- MS. DEONARINE: I assume Tom
- 25 Devaney is also.

1

2	MR.	DEVANEY:	Yeah.	Ι'm	familiar

- 3 with that.
- 4 MS. HOLAK: Great. So Tom's
- 5 there. So like most grants, we require quarterly
- 6 reporting for MWBE. That is something that we will
- 7 check on.
- 8 And then 23 is the project status
- 9 reports. So that's only required twice. So
- 10 every -- semi annually. So every June 30th and
- 11 December 31st is when those project status reports
- 12 are to be submitted. Some communities will submit
- it a little bit earlier, some a little bit later.
- If it's not submitted, you know,
- around that time, contracts will be sending out
- 16 e-mails. It's important to keep up to date with
- 17 the project status reports. If there will be any
- 18 extensions or if the project is putting in a
- 19 payment request, the project status reports and the
- 20 MWBE reporting is looked at and considered to be up
- 21 to date and being followed through.
- MS. DEONARINE: Irene, I have a
- 23 question about that one.
- MS. HOLAK: Yes.
- MS. DEONARINE: So if I was

1 2 getting ready to do another status report, so I 3 don't have to do one for the end of September? MS. HOLAK: So if that is the 4 5 status report that you would like to be submitted in December, that's fine. It's just we would 6 really like to see it done semi annually. Would 7 there be a reason why you're submitting it early? 9 MS. DEONARINE: No, I just thought 10 I had to do it quarterly. And then what's the 11 review for the MWBE because nothing's changed since 12 our last quarterly report. Do I just send a report 13 that says that? 14 MS. HOLAK: For the MWBE? 15 MS. DEONARINE: Yeah, you would 16 just submit there hasn't been any updates. 17 So the MWBE needs to be done 18 quarterly. 19 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. 20 MS. HOLAK: I believe that's 21 March, June, September and December. 22 MS. DEONARINE: Okay.

- 11 the DOS to update the project. It's just simply

- description of activities. It doesn't need to be
- 14 reviewed or, historically, the last 20 years I've
- been here, it hasn't been reviewed by the
- 16 committees.
- MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
- 18 MR. BRAUN: I mean, the committee
- 19 gets the meeting minutes in which you describe what
- 20 happens, that's similar.
- MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.
- MR. BRAUN: But the actual status
- report is between the Town, you and the DOS.
- MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
- 25 CHAIR KEANE: It doesn't need to

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2	be voted on is what you're saying?
3	MR. BRAUN: Yes, it does not.
4	CHAIR KEANE: Thank you.
5	MS. DEONARINE: I'll just report
6	it out at the next committee meeting. Okay.
7	MS. HOLAK: So the project status
8	report would need to follow the grant. So there's
9	a column that has the tasks. So they would need to
10	mirror and be the tasks in this work plan that
11	we've that we're reading.
12	So on the project status report it
13	would need to say, task 23 project status report,
14	with with the dates, and if it's tentative or
15	actual. For actual, you'd need the actual date
16	that that task or meeting or draft had been
17	accomplished and then a description of what the
18	updates and what has been done.
19	And then the last section is, what
20	has been submitted. So what has been submitted to
21	the Department of State, as Kevin is saying, we
22	would need, again, the products that are listed in
23	here that we've been going through.
24	So to complete task 1, so this

25

kickoff meeting, we would need the minutes or

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2	summary of this meeting and the outcomes of that.
3	For some of these it would be a
4	plan, for others it would be, you know,
5	presentation or outreach.
6	Does that make sense?
7	MS. DEONARINE: Yes. Yeah.
8	MS. HOLAK: Okay. So 24 is the
9	final document. So we would need a final status
10	report that's indicated final status report. And
11	for it to be final, all the tasks would need to be
12	100 percent.
13	We have another project summary
14	report that needs to be filled out. And then
15	there's measurable results that don't necessarily
16	are exactly in line with a lot of these projects
17	but they are closely in line. So that would need
18	to be submitted to kind of capture what the
19	outcomes or results of the project will be.
20	And that and then the last
21	section is the project responsibilities, which I'm
22	not going to go over. Because we've essentially

gone over a lot of that.

The other thing that would need to
be submitted is not necessarily part of this

- 2 project, is the SEQRA or Environmental Review. So
- 3 we're not going to discuss that.
- 4 But a payment request is
- 5 periodically -- will be submitted to the Department
- of State. Periodically communities will do it
- 7 simultaneously with their MWBE reporting. Some
- 8 communities won't submit a payment request until,
- 9 you know, six months into a project or they'll just
- do one every year.
- 11 It is -- it's nice to do it on a
- more quarterly or semiannually basis just to keep
- 13 up with parts and the payment requests will
- indicate the project tasks that have been
- 15 completed, the time and what you're charging to the
- 16 State and the match.
- 17 I'll just indicate that if you are
- not submitting in a payment request the match, this
- 19 particular grant is 25/75. So 25 local match, 75
- 20 State match. So the payment requests that only
- 21 have State funds requested, will be reduced to 75
- 22 percent of what's being requested.
- So if, you know, you would like
- 24 to -- the State to pay \$50,000, you would need to
- 25 have match included in there to get that -- that

1 2 whole payment. Does that make sense? 3 MS. DEONARINE: Yes. MS. HOLAK: 4 Okay. 5 Kevin, I can't remember -- or Tom, I can't remember if you've had that conversation 6 but I wanted to state that as you're preparing a 7 8 payment request for the projects that we've been working on? 9 10 MR. BRAUN: Yes, we've made them. 11 MS. HOLAK: Okay. Great. 12 So that's essentially the contract in a nutshell. I've done a lot of talking. I know 13 14 Sarah has indicated to me that she's the local 15 project coordinator. 16 I wasn't sure if there's any 17 advisory committees or subcommittees that are 18 applicable. If not, that's fine. But at this time I'm going to pass it along to Sarah. 19 20 MR. BRAUN: Irene, one question 21 before you move on.

3	we're not billable hours period. So you keep track
4	of your own time. There's not going to be any
5	certification that's going to come from the Town,
6	that's going to tell your time or my time. That's
7	not how we do it here.
8	So in just recording your time
9	just know you have to just record it yourself and
10	keep it available for possible audits later.
11	Is that correct, Irene?
12	MS. HOLAK: Yes. So there are
13	forms and attachments that go along with the
14	payment requests that should have been sent out
15	when the contract had been executed. And if not, I
16	can send those out. But like Tom's (sic) saying,
17	for every individual that's listed under salaries,
18	for instance in the budget, would need to have a
19	separate form for their hours. So you would need
20	to record your hours and have that on the sheet and
21	have have that be submitted.
22	MR. BRAUN: Right. I was just
23	trying to make a distinction between us being able

25

to certify the hours via a third party. We're

going to record our time. The time is on the sheet

- 2 that's provided but it's not like that we -- we
- 3 don't have certified payroll is what I'm trying to
- 4 clear up.
- 5 MS. HOLAK: Right. Like you're
- 6 saying individual. So each individual that's
- 7 working on the project, need to record their own
- 8 hours and time. Right.
- 9 MS. DEONARINE: And I send out,
- 10 whenever I send out anything for the committee to
- 11 review, I also send out the -- I can't remember
- 12 which attachment it is but it's for volunteer
- 13 services.
- MS. HOLAK: Right.
- 15 And looking at volunteers, so
- 16 volunteer time -- community time, is at at \$15 an
- 17 hour rate. Donated professional services, which
- 18 would be by the professional engineer, so that
- 19 would be you, Robert, would be at a \$60 per hour
- 20 rate.
- So when you're allocating the
- 22 time, keep that into consideration. We have a
- local match amount that's listed in the grant.
- MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
- MR. BRAUN: Just one more

2	question	for	Bob.

- Bob, you're going to provide
- 4 engineering services or are you just going to
- 5 review the volunteer?
- 6 CHAIR KEANE: I don't know. I
- 7 mean, I --
- 8 MS. HOLAK: It says to assist
- 9 reviewing RFA application and technical review of
- 10 the plan. So it's predominately just reviewing.
- 11 It just assisting with the review.
- MR. BRAUN: I mean, I guess we can
- 13 talk about this later, Bob, but I can put my
- 14 professional engineer, you would probably just be
- 15 an advisor. We can discuss this at another time.
- 16 CHAIR KEANE: That's fine.
- 17 MS. DEONARINE: So I see -- who's
- using your IPhone -- who's using an IPhone?
- MS. HOLAK: I'm sorry. What's
- 20 that?
- MS. DEONARINE: So I'm trying to
- 22 establish if we have a quorum right now.
- 23 FEMALE VOICE: Is it Mr. Seagull,

2	MS. DEONARINE: No. So then the
3	municipal representatives are the people you see on

5	I'm the local project coordinator
6	and we'll be hiring a consultant. The municipal
7	counsel is handled by the Town Attorney's office.
8	This is the overarching advisory
9	committee, the Manhasset Bay Protection Committee
10	but in order to review applications, I would like
11	to form a subcommittee. That has to be moved by
12	the Chair. The Chair, Bob, has to actually call
13	for that.
14	And I think we have a quorum.
15	CHAIR KEANE: I sent a check to
16	(inaudible) IPhone. No response yet.
17	MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
18	MR. BRAUN: Sarah, if I may make a
19	suggestion.
20	MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
21	MR. BRAUN: At this point, I

22 believe that Irene has gone through the project

work plan, which is required to do at the first 23

24 kickoff meeting. I don't know if we need her for

24 MS. DEONARINE: No.

25 CHAIR KEANE: No. Okay.

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- 2 Do we want to figure out who we
- 3 want to be on that committee?
- I think I might be.
- 5 MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.
- 6 CHAIR KEANE: Just so you can get
- 7 the extra match.
- FEMALE VOICE: Who's not here?
- 9 (Laughter.)
- MS. DEONARINE: So obviously I'll
- 11 be on the subcommittee.
- MR. BRAUN: Well, you happen to be
- 13 the director. You get to be on the subcommittee.
- 14 You're the director.
- MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
- MR. BRAUN: So just so you know,
- 17 when you do -- I'm definitely, I have to be on the
- 18 subcommittee. I should be. But just so you know,
- 19 you're going to submit names to DOS and it's not
- 20 surprisingly if they should say you should get some
- 21 other people for diversity. They've done that to
- me before.
- 23 And I mean diversity, not all --
- 24 not all public -- not all government officials or
- 25 government village -- village appointees. So just

2 don't be -- don't be shocked by the fact that they

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- 3 ask for different diversity.
- 4 CHAIR KEANE: You're saying
- 5 somebody outside of the committee?
- 6 MR. BRAUN: They have suggested at
- 7 times that I go out in the community. Like I -- I
- 8 had to pick up for one of the projects in Manhasset
- 9 Bay, I had to pick like P. W. Green and other
- 10 people to be on Baywalk committee.
- 11 So I'm just saying, I don't know.
- 12 The DOS constantly -- seems to be in flux at times
- as to what their -- what they want. But I'm just
- 14 trying to make sure you guys know that there may be
- some adjustment in whoever you pick.
- MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
- 17 CHAIR KEANE: Understood. But
- 18 that was also -- but yours was just a town specific
- 19 grant. Obviously we have a diverse group here now
- 20 represented by 13 villages. So maybe that will be
- 21 enough.
- MR. BRAUN: Okay. You can make
- 23 that -- you can make that argument. But once
- 24 again, the DOS decides and approves. So that's
- 25 what I'm trying to say.

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2	CHAIR KEANE: That's fine.
3	So I guess we can get started with
4	an initial subcommittee and if they want additional
5	people, they'll let us know.
6	MR. BRAUN: Right.
7	And I would also suggest you make
8	the subcommittee small so it's workable.
9	MS. DEONARINE: Should we get a
10	third person?
11	MR. BRAUN: You should probably
12	get three you should probably get four. Four
13	plus maybe.
14	CHAIR KEANE: We're appointing two
15	but everybody's got different people next to
16	them.
17	MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. Do I start
18	volunteering people or is there anybody who wants
19	to volunteer?
20	MR. BRAUN: This is going to be a

22 CHAIR KEANE: Guess who's

23 underneath me.

volunteer mission.

24 (Laughter.)

25 CHAIR KEANE: Jennifer.

1 2 MS. WILSON-PINES: And I can 3 always be North Shore Audubon Society if they want 4 diversity. 5 MS. DEONARINE: Definitely. CHAIR KEANE: So that's Kevin, 6 Jennifer, Bob and Sarah so far. 7 MR. BRAUN: Maybe one more. CHAIR KEANE: Again, who else 9 isn't here right now? 10 11 (Laughter.) 12 MR. BRAUN: Yeah. Or, Sarah, they can just submit their names if they don't feel 13 14 comfortable at this point or you can go ahead and 15 address them individually. MS. DEONARINE: So a community 16 17 member, Steve Klyce has become rather active. 18 (Laughter.) 19 MS. DEONARINE: So should we make 20 a motion for a preliminary subcommittee formed of

Bob, Kevin and Jennifer, the usual suspects.

MR. BRAUN: I do think they're

- said, I had one of the biggest projects that I've
- 25 been working on in the Town, Roslyn Pond, and I

- 2 haven't been able to focus on much of -- many other
- 3 things.
- 4 MS. WILSON-PINES: Well, you had
- 5 made a number of suggestions.
- 6 MS. DEONARINE: Yes. I got
- 7 comments from Jennifer, DOS. Irene has --
- MR. BRAUN: Yes. She likes to
- 9 edit.
- 10 CHAIR KEANE: It's just a matter
- of being transcribed here. So --
- MS. DEONARINE: So it's up to the
- 13 committee.
- MR. BRAUN: Well, I'm going to
- make one suggestion and then I'll be all right with
- 16 whatever the committee decides.
- 17 Sarah, I would suggest you taking
- 18 out the -- the total fee can not exceed number
- 19 under attachment A. I don't know why you put that
- in there but what my experience is, is that
- 21 contractors will not give you a complete, fair
- 22 price. They'd go right up to that number.
- 23 And what happens is, you have
- three or four contractors all at that number when
- 25 they could provide services a little cheaper.

2 And I know Bob's in consulting and

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- 3 he probably would go right up to that number if he
- 4 had to.
- 5 So --
- 6 CHAIR KEANE: I'm a contractor
- 7 now.
- 8 MR. BRAUN: What?
- 9 CHAIR KEANE: I said, I'm a
- 10 contractor now so I would definitely go to that
- 11 number.
- MR. BRAUN: Exactly.
- MS. DEONARINE: But my experience
- 14 has been, if you don't put out a number, the range
- is so wide and then if you end up going for the
- lowest bidder, it's no good.
- MR. BRAUN: Okay. That's up to
- 18 you. But you're going to get -- but the real
- 19 consultants that are going to be in play know how
- 20 much these things cost. Like B&D the first one and
- 21 they know it's going to be an upgrade of what they
- 22 have there already.
- So it's up to you. It's just a
- 24 suggestion. Take it or leave it. I, in all the
- 25 RFPs that I have put out, do not give a number

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- because it doesn't necessarily apply. I, you know,
- 3 they can do their research if they want to find out
- 4 how much the grant amounts were. That being said,
- 5 that doesn't -- that doesn't provide them the
- 6 complete picture because they don't get the match
- 7 requirements themselves.
- 8 It's up to you. It's just a
- 9 suggestion. I don't put it in any of my grants --
- 10 I mean, in my RFPs.
- MS. WILSON-PINES: Yeah, I mean,
- they're all going to look up the award. That's for
- 13 sure.
- MR. BRAUN: You'd be surprised.
- And like I said, the award doesn't
- 16 necessarily follow the format of providing matches.
- 17 So it can say there's a total award but they don't
- 18 know that \$40,000 is volunteer time coming from the
- 19 committee.
- MS. DEONARINE: Right. But it
- gives them a ball park.
- MR. BRAUN: Right.
- MS. WILSON-PINES: Okay.
- MR. BRAUN: I hope at this point
- 25 they have a ball park. If they're any kind of good

- 2 consultant, they do.
- MS. DEONARINE: But then I don't
- 4 know what we do if somebody comes in over that
- 5 amount?
- 6 MR. BRAUN: They don't get it.
- 7 MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
- 8 All right.
- 9 MR. BRAUN: Once again, this is
- 10 just a suggestion. It's just a suggestion. Take
- it or leave it. I'll be all right. Tomorrow
- morning I'll wake up and I'll still be fine.
- 13 CHAIR KEANE: But is this an RFP
- 14 where it's just going to be a public RFP or are we
- 15 like short listing people?
- MR. BRAUN: Bob, we can have that
- 17 discussion off transcript.
- 18 CHAIR KEANE: Okay.
- MS. DEONARINE: The committee --
- those members who are here now, are they
- 21 comfortable with approving the RFP or do you want
- 22 more time to review it?
- MS. WILSON-PINES: I've already
- 24 reviewed it -- so.
- 25 CHAIR KEANE: Like I said, I have

- 2 not.
- 3 MS. WILSON-PINES: It's okay with
- 4 me.
- 5 CHAIR KEANE: If you feel
- 6 comfortable with it, I mean, I'm like Kevin. I'm
- 7 not going to lose sleep but I've just been totally
- 8 bombarded with work.
- 9 MS. DEONARINE: Would you be able
- 10 to review it by October 15th. That's our next
- 11 scheduled meeting?
- 12 CHAIR KEANE: Yes.
- MR. BRAUN: And, Sarah, I'll even
- do you one better. I think you should be able to
- set a deadline for people to provide you comments
- in the next couple of weeks with the anticipation
- of approving it at the next meeting.
- 18 Like, if I had a little bit more
- 19 time, I'm sorry I didn't get to it, once again, i
- 20 apologize. Things have been weird. But if you
- 21 provide me -- if you have a drop dead date with all
- comments received by now, if not it's going out.
- 23 Then it's on me. It's my fault if I don't get
- 24 there.
- MS. DEONARINE: So you're saying

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- 2 approve it now but any comments on it have to be
- 3 received by October 2nd or --
- 4 MR. BRAUN: No, next meeting is
- 5 October what?
- MS. DEONARINE: Fifteenth.
- 7 MR. BRAUN: Yeah, I would say all
- 8 comments need to be in by the Friday of the first
- 9 week in October or something like that or forever
- 10 hold your peace.
- MS. DEONARINE: Okay. And then
- vote to approve on October 15th.
- MR. BRAUN: Yes.
- MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
- MR. BRAUN: If that's fair for
- the rest of the committee?
- MS. WILSON-PINES: Okay. I have
- no problem with that as long as we get a marked up
- 19 version that shows the -- the changes that were
- 20 accepted.
- MR. BRAUN: Yeah, none of this
- 22 Google stuff where it already tracks changes and
- 23 accepts.
- MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. Okay. So
- 25 by October 8th and then hopefully I can turn it

2 around by October 9th to send out for review over

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- 3 the weekend before the next meeting.
- 4 MR. BRAUN: You can do it earlier
- 5 if you want, Sarah. I mean, I'm okay with -- I

WILSON-PINES: Yeah. We had 16 more than -- we had more than one grant from them. 17 CHAIR KEANE: So I think we're 18 designed to get them out. 22 Constable. There was a boom kit.

23 MR. BRAUN: Yeah, but Jennifer,

- MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.
- MR. BRAUN: Oh. Nobody's going

- MS. WILSON-PINES: Okay. I mean,
- 21 we did it -- it was a Clean Water grant that we
- 22 had.
- MR. BRAUN: Yeah.
- MS. WILSON-PINES: So it was not
- 25 like out of the --

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- 3 hearts.
- 4 MS. WILSON-PINES: The kindness
- 5 of our hearts, yeah.
- 6 CHAIR KEANE: Okay.
- 7 MS. DEONARINE: All right.
- 8 Do you want updates?
- 9 CHAIR KEANE: Yeah, very quickly.
- 10 You said you wanted to pass on them but are they
- 11 quick?
- MS. DEONARINE: No, I wanted to
- pass on that discussion about -- it was quick.
- 14 Okay.
- So updates. We received the 2020
- 16 dues from everyone but Nassau County. But
- 17 everybody else is --
- 18 CHAIR KEANE: This is 2020 dues?
- MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
- 20 CHAIR KEANE: So we did receive
- 21 Nassau County's 2019 dues?
- MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
- 23 CHAIR KEANE: Okay. Just one
- 24 more question about that. Did we submit whatever
- 25 paperwork we had to for them or is that -- okay?

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2	MS. DEONARINE: So the committee
3	is a member of the Waterfront Advisory Committee,
4	the Town Board Waterfront Advisory Committee. And
5	we will stay on as a committee member for that
6	committee. But there's been a couple of meetings
7	and I thought you guys would like updates from
8	that.
9	One of them being that Steven
10	Klyce is a new committee member on (inaudible) as
11	the community representative.
12	So the Manorhaven Boat Ramp is
13	dredging will begin October 1st. So that is, you
14	know, Manorhaven Beach Park. So there will be a
15	de-watering site within that parking lot so
16	whatever dredge spoils are pulled out from the
17	bottom will be put in the parking lot surrounded by
18	hay bales and allowed to de-water for 90 days. So
19	that parking lot space will be taken up through
20	until the spring in Manorhaven. It takes about
21	90 days to and then it'll get shipped off
22	Island.
23	The window for dredging starts
24	October 1st and closes December 31st when all

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dredging will be done by the 31st.

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2	So that's exciting because right
3	now the boat ramp is only accessible at high tide.
4	So that's been long overdue.
5	And that is a FEMA reimbursable
6	project.
7	Also, you know a culvert is
8	silently being repaired and that is also FEMA
9	reimbursable so that will well, first of all
10	save the road and second, it will also allow for
11	better water exchange between Manhasset Bay and the
12	Town.
13	There is work moving towards
14	dredging around Town docks. That is also FEMA
15	reimbursable. However, there's an area that's
16	outside the FEMA purview that includes I'm just
17	going to pull up a map to show you. But the main
18	purpose of it is to allow access to commercial
19	sites on Manhasset Isle.
20	So in the future we may be asked
21	by the Waterfront Advisory Committee to try and
22	convince the Town to include the extra cost of the
23	dredging in their capital plan future capital

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2	It's not specifically water

- 3 summer but they were not confirmed and it's
- 4 unlikely that they were actually sharks.
- 5 But the Town is writing a protocol
- 6 in case there are verified shark sightings in
- 7 Manhasset Bay.
- 8 Okay. So those are the updates
- 9 from the Waterfront Advisory Committee -- the
- 10 Town's Waterfront Advisory Committee.
- 11 MR. HERBERT: Did anybody mention
- 12 all of the rays in the Bay?
- MS. DEONARINE: Yes, we did. The
- 14 cow nosed rays. Yes.
- MR. HERBERT: Yeah, hundreds of
- 16 them. Thousands.
- MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. So the
- 18 thought was was that that's probably what people
- 19 say in the Bay. And that was exciting.
- Jen, is that usual? I've never
- 21 heard of that.
- MS. WILSON-PINES: No, no, not at
- 23 all.
- MR. HERBERT: No, nobody's ever
- 25 heard of it.

- MR. BRAUN: No, that's a new one
- 3 by my standards too.
- 4 MR. HERBERT: And there are
- 5 literally schools of thousands of them where, you
- 6 know, people were fishing for other things and they
- 7 were catching rays. You know, and they were either
- 8 Manta Rays. I'm not sure what type of rays they
- 9 were.
- MR. BRAUN: Cow nosed.
- MS. WILSON-PINES: Cow nosed
- 12 Rays.
- MR. HERBERT: What's that?
- MS. WILSON-PINES: Cow nosed
- 15 rays.
- MR. HERBERT: Okay.
- MR. BRAUN: It's just another sign
- 18 that the water quality improvement of Manhasset
- 19 Bay.
- MR. HERBERT: Or the temperature
- 21 and improving and getting hotter.
- 22 CHAIR KEANE: Do we have any
- 23 photos of those that you can share on social media?
- MS. WILSON-PINES: That would be
- 25 nice.

1 2 FEMALE VOICE: I actually do. My husband took a lot of them. He was fishing. 3 They're not that clear but I'll see if I can send 4 5 them to you. He has some video. MS. DEONARINE: Okay. I'm trying 6 to keep track of time. 7 So the committee is also a member of the Long Island Sound Study Citizens Advisory 9 10 Committee and we, again, participated in that

11 social marketing -- wait, social media campaign 12 over the summer about reducing the use of plastics 13 and plastic pollution in our waterways.

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The Long Island Sound Study is apparently choosing their priorities for the next five years and so I've been involved in commenting on that. The committee -- or the Long Island Sound Committee has also been getting more and more federal funding every year. I don't remember what the numbers is up to but that's good for water quality improvements across Long Island Sound.

And the last meeting was entirely 23 devoted to discussing public access opportunities. So something for the committee to consider, though 25 not necessarily vote on it, is whether we should

1 2 pursue public access options in putting that in our water quality improvement plan. Public access for 3 people who appreciate the waterways that are in --4 are more apt to help protect it. It's just something for consideration at this time. 6 Also, the -- well, the Long Island 7 Sound Study Committee is doing the community-based social marketing training. It was supposed to be in 9 April and it's going to be expensive but it's 10 11 actually now going to be on line and it's free. 12 The committee voted to send two people to it. And 13 so I'm participating. So if anybody else on the 14 committee wants to participate, you have to let me 15 know asap because it is next week, Monday through 16 Tuesday. 17 MR. BRAUN: Sarah, it is free; 18 right? 19 MS. DEONARINE: Yes.

MR. BRAUN: Do you know where the push is coming from for this? Because I have never

gotten so many invites in my life. Is it attached

23 to a grant or is there some reason why they're

24 pushing this so much?

MS. DEONARINE: Well -- so the

- 2 Long Island Sound Study did it ten years ago. It
- 3 might be that it's part of their CCMP because
- 4 instead of focusing on just advertising about
- 5 things to do, it's actually meant to try and change
- 6 people's behavior so that they are more likely to
- 7 actually do what's right for the environment.
- 8 I don't know -- it would be from
- 9 the communications team of the Long Island Sound
- 10 Study.
- 11 MR. BRAUN: Okay. No worries.
- 12 That's fine.
- MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. There --
- 14 also, over the summer, I purchased a new domain
- name, which was approved in 2018 as something to go
- forward with. So we have two domains:
- 17 themanhassetbayprotectioncommittee.org. And
- 18 manhassetbay.net. And I'll keep a look out for any
- 19 openings in other -- like manhassetbay.com sort of
- 20 thing.
- 21 CHAIR KEANE: No MBPC?
- MS. DEONARINE: No, that one
- 23 wasn't available. I'm going to keep trying for
- 24 other ones though.
- Well, manhassetbay.net is not bad.

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2	And there's been no movement on
3	getting the website redesigned. So we'll follow up
4	on that.
5	And then so for our DEC water
6	quality monitoring grant, which we get that with
7	the other North Shore and Baymen. Hempstead Harbor
8	has completely expended their portion of the grant
9	and we have expended none of it.
10	But we do have a contract in place
11	with Dvirka and Bartilucci to do a quality
12	assurance project plan and the data usability
13	agreement report. As soon as they have been
14	approved by the State Department of Environmental
15	Conservation so we can start expending funds.
16	So a big grant is set to expire
17	this year but we're already working on getting a
18	one-year extension. Because it's not only us who's
19	behind. Everybody except for Hempstead Harbor is
20	behind. It was also the Cold Spring Harbor,
21	Oyster Bay the North Shore, is there as well.
22	Okay. And so that's the end of
23	all my updates.
24	CHAIR KEANE: Anybody else have

any updates they want to share? Besides the cow

- 3 MS. WILSON-PINES: Manorhaven
- 4 Village election, the mayor and one of the Trustees

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- 5 retained their seats. So I expect things to stay
- 6 the same.
- 7 CHAIR KEANE: Anybody else?
- 8 MR. KLYCE: Well, if I can say a
- 9 word, I just wanted to -- I listened in on the
- 10 Hempstead Harbor Protection Committee meeting last
- 11 week, or a few days ago. And they also said that,
- in their initial water quality report, they found
- 13 that the pathogens that were identified in
- 14 Hempstead Harbor were not of human origin. That is
- 15 the fecal matter was from some other source.
- So this is preliminary findings
- but kind of interesting. Perhaps we still need to
- investigate the goose problem.
- 19 MS. WILSON-PINES: I believe that
- 20 they had some grant money to do DNA testing, which
- 21 is still a rather dicey subject not --
- 22 CHAIR KEANE: Conclusive?
- MS. WILSON-PINES: Yeah.
- MR. KLYCE: Non-conclusive but
- 25 still.

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- 3 basically what they can tell us it's -- it's
- 4 mammalian, non-mammalian. In order to identify
- 5 specific animals they have to -- they have to
- 6 actually take samples from local populations so
- 7 that they have a base line.
- 8 MR. KLYCE: Yeah. But I would
- 9 also report that the Town of North Hempstead has
- 10 decided to hire the Goose Chasers to use their dogs
- 11 to chase the geese off of Town parks. As a result,
- 12 I live on the water and so we now have a big goose
- 13 problem, not only on our property but in Manhasset
- 14 Bay -- so.
- MS. WILSON-PINES: Well, the Town
- has had dogs before. That's not new.
- MR. KLYCE: Well, that's true but
- 18 they just passed a resolution about a month ago, or
- 19 three weeks ago, and we -- we had no problem all
- 20 summer long and all of a sudden we have geese --
- 21 so.
- MS. DEONARINE: And the Town did
- 23 have different programs in place but then they
- stopped. So that's good that it's starting up
- 25 again.

1 2 MS. WILSON-PINES: Yeah. 3 CHAIR KEANE: Well, it's good for them but not for Steve. 4 5 (Laughter.) MS. WILSON-PINES: It's a little 6 bit early but we are seeing early migration among 7 8 other species so you may also be seeing the arrival of some of the non-domestic migratory geese. 9 10 MR. KLYCE: Trust me, these are 11 resident Canadian geese that we've been seeing. I 12 recognize the migration patterns of the other geese that fly through here and these are resident geese. 13 14 MR. BRAUN: Did you check their 15 ID? 16 (Laughter.) 17 MR. KLYCE: Absolutely. Tier tags 18 and the whole thing. I mean ear tags. 19 CHAIR KEANE: Because if they're 20 coming from out of state they have to quarantine 21 somewhere. So they may be staying in your yard for 22 14 days. 23 (Laughter.) 24 (Overlapping conversation.)
